**OTTAWA, Jan. 17—(CP)**—R.C.A.F. headquarters announced today that the Women's Division of the air force has a new uniform for the new year, streamlined and executed with the aid of Canada's foremost dress designers, is practical, unchanged in color, material and insignia. It offers pointers in wartime chic, practicality and fabric thrift to every well-dressed woman, the announcement added.

**PROLONGING LIFE OF WASHING MACHINES**

By prolonging the life of present day washing machines, the war-conscious housewife can save not only metal and rubber, but electric power, time, and the clothes themselves.

A periodic check up to see that all the screws and bolts are tight is advised by Consumer Information should be looked over by a reliable serviceman. Parts should be re-

**PLACED BEFORE THEY GIVE OUT ENTIRELY.**

Oil runs rubber, therefore housewives should take care not to spill oil on the rubber parts of the machine. Oil can be removed with soap and water. This should be cleaned up immediately.

Do not pour very hot water into the tub of the machine. Hot water poured into the cold tub may crack the enamel finish.

As too heavy a load may lock the rolls and even strip the gears, it should be made certain that the wringers are set at the proper pressure for the thickness of the clothes.

Do not place too much water in the tub. Too much water may strain the motor. On the other hand too little does a poor washing job.

Also be careful in washing not to put too many clothes in the machine. Too many will not wash clean, and may strain the motor or cause the tub to blow out.

The minute the wringing out is finished, the pressure on the rolls should be released to save rubber. Springs should be kept clear of lint, and the surface dry and clean when the machine is not in use. To save rubber, it is important that all water be drained out of the hose connections.

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**OF Tufts Of Candlewick Yarn**

You may be "all thumbs" but we insist you can make this rug—a fluffy tufted beauty that sets off your dressing table and you! The hardest thing you do is tie the knots!

Your materials, for a striped design, are three soft shades of candlewick yarn—perhaps white, rose and blue—and a mullin base.

Pencil the stripes evenly along diagonal creases in the mullin and, parallel to the creases, rule lines an inch apart over the whole surface. Make dots an inch apart on the lines. Now, passing a needle threaded with candlewick through a dot (see our sketch), take an 1/8-inch stitch and lay a tuft of sixteen 2 1/2-inch lengths of yarn across it. Then tie the ends of stitch around tuft, in a tight knot.
