The marine and fisheries department is getting the buoy service on the east and south coasts of Nova Scotia in order. The Aberdeen, which was operating about Prince Edward Island and the eastern coast, returned Saturday night with summer buoys on board. She will leave in a few days to supply the lighthouses on the eastern shore. Owing to the Lady Laurier being laid up for repairs, the Aberdeen will make a trip to Sable Island before Christmas. The Stanley has returned from replacing buoys reported a drift. The buoys at Whitehead and other places were replaced. 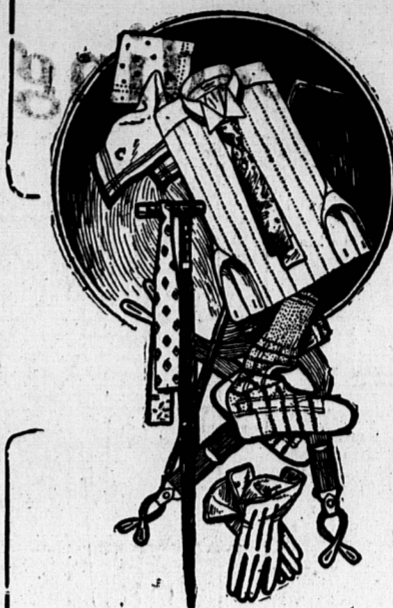

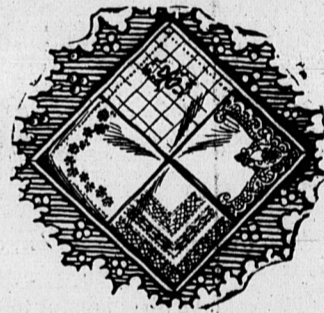
