John Gray, of the firm of Gray & Boullivar, Kentville has returned from Charlottetown with a car load of horses, which they intend to use at their mill in Mosherville. Mr. Gray reports good horses scarce and high on the Island.

Rev. S. Weston-Jones formerly rector of St. Paul's Church here was among the passengers who arrived in St. John on Wednesday by the S. S. Lake Manitoba. He went to Windsor yesterday where the King's College will confer upon him the degree of M. A.

R. Barry Smith, I. C. R. inspector who has been at Georgetown making investigation regarding the matter of stolen whiskey, coal, etc., was in the city yesterday accompanied by his secretary, Mr. Proulx. He went to Summerside in the afternoon.

Rev. W. T. Suckling came to the City yesterday from Sydney. Mr. Suckling has been Locum Tenens in Christ Church in that city since the resignation of the Very Rev. Dean Schofield. Rev. Mr. Suckling is exchanging with Rev. W. Godfrey, who has been elected rector of Christ Church Sydney as announced some days ago in The Guardian.

The birds of Prince Edward Island and their usefulness, was the subject of a pleasing lecture given the students of St. Dunstan's College by their assembly last evening by Mr. Carbonell with the aid of Mr. Morrison who illustrated every species of which the lecturer spoke. Mr. Carbonell dwelt briefly on the nature and habits of more than 200 different species. At the Hillsboro Consolidated School yesterday the children held a Mock Parliament. Hon. Arthur Hayden of Vernon River, acted as Governor General; Hon. Emma Corish of Cross Roads was Speaker; Hon. Spurgeon Jenkins, of Mt. Albion, Premier, and Hon. Pauntleroy Kennedy of Cross Roads, Leader of the Opposition. Among other bills discussed was one to prohibit the running of automobiles; one to admit Mt. Albion School district to the Macdonald Consolidated School; one to have two trains daily on the Murray Harbour Branch; one to appoint a commission on education; one to provide for an experimental farm at Alexandra, etc. His Excellency Governor Hayden arrived and opened the House at 2 o'clock.
