Pneumonia seized her few days previous to death. Miss Clarke made her home in Springfield some two and half years ago, and was beloved by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance.

THE Diocesan Church Society and Church Convention hold their regular annual meetings today and to-morrow as follows:—The Executive Committee of the D. C. S. meet this afternoon at 3.30. There will be services in St. Paul's Church at 7.30 this evening and afterwards a reception in the Schoolroom. To-morrow Holy Communion will be administered in St. Paul's Church at 8 a. m. The Church Convention will hold its session at 3 p. m., and the D. C. S. its general meeting at 7.30 p. m.

St. Paul's Schoolroom was crowded to the doors last night to hear Revs. J. O. Stringer and H. H. Haslam speak on missionary work. Mr. Stringer told of the work in the far north among the Eskimaux and showed many interesting curios and fine views of the Eskimaux life in the Arctic Circle. Mr. Haslam who is travelling secretary for the Canadian Missionary Association spoke forcefully of the opportunities of missionary work throughout the world. Mr. Haslam leaves for India in August next.

A PAINFUL accident occurred last night about eight o'clock near Hampton in which Mac Shaw of DeSable suffered a severe injury. Mr. Shaw was returning from Victoria with a young horse and started to drive down to the DeSable ice to witness some sport there. On the way down the animal became frightened and ran away and Mr. Shaw after being dragged some distance was thrown against the lobster factory. Upon hurried examination it was found that his shoulder was either dislocated or the muscle broken. Dr. Robertson was at once sent for and it is hoped that under his care Mr. Shaw will be around again shortly.

THERE was a good attendance at the Baptist schoolroom to hear Rev. H. P. Calder, Summerside lecture on the Pillars of Our Civilization. The Rev. gentleman observed the pillars to be the philosopher, worker, talker, gossip, fool, crank, etc. each line of which he developed in the course of his lecture which was unusually interesting showing much originality, variety and at times flights of oratory. A. F. Webster occupied the chair and at the close a vote of thanks moved by Rev. J. L. Miner seconded by A. W. Sterns was unanimously carried.

Rev. Father Murphy's lecture last night was a pronounced success in every particular. A large number was present in the spacious basement hall of St. Dunstan's Cathedral and the close and earnest attention of the audience testified to the merit of the lecture. All the speakers expressed the wish that the learned lecturer would soon again appear on the lecture platform in which direction he appears to be eminently talented. Mr. McCarey, president of the C. M. B. A., occupied the chair. A brief but choice musical program preceded the lecture. Mrs. Byrne, Miss Josephine Smith, and Mr. Hermans in vocal solos and Mr. Roy in a musical selection.

THE sad news of the death of Mrs. D. K. McNeill, New Dominion on Sunday was heard with regret by many in the town and country. The deceased had enjoyed her usual health up to a short time ago, when she contracted pleurisy and pneumonia, which caused her death only three weeks after her mother had passed away. Mrs. McNeill was a daughter of Andrew Dickieson, of New Dominion, and leaves a sorrowing husband and five children, a father, three brothers and two sisters to mourn. Two of her brothers, John, who had been in Boston, and Judson in Winnipeg, arrived home at the time of their mother's death and have not yet returned. George is with his father on the homestead. The sisters are Annie, at home, and Lizzie, teacher in Long Creek school. The deceased was highly respected and beloved by all with whom she was acquainted. The Guardian extends its sincere sympathy to the sorrowing relatives and friends.

THE regular monthly meeting of the Board of School Trustees was held last evening. The teachers' reports showed the enrolment for the past month to be 1288, the actual attendance 1279, the average 1088, the percentage 86. There were 254 cases of tardiness, and 1 case of truancy. The teachers made 209 visits to parents and sent 60 notices. There were 7 cases of corporal punishment and 117 requests to leave school before the hour for closing. The Committee on property who had visited the schools to ascertain what repairs, new furniture &c, were required, submitted a report which was adopted. The Committee on estimates also submitted a report. It was agreed that a special meeting be called to pass the estimates. The following resolution was passed regarding teachers who were not punctual in attendance—Resolved that any teacher who shall be late more frequently than twice in one month shall be required to explain the reason thereof personally to the Board. A detailed statement of the expenditure for the past year was submitted. The total expenditure for all purposes was \$10,752.06. After passing some bills the meeting adjourned.

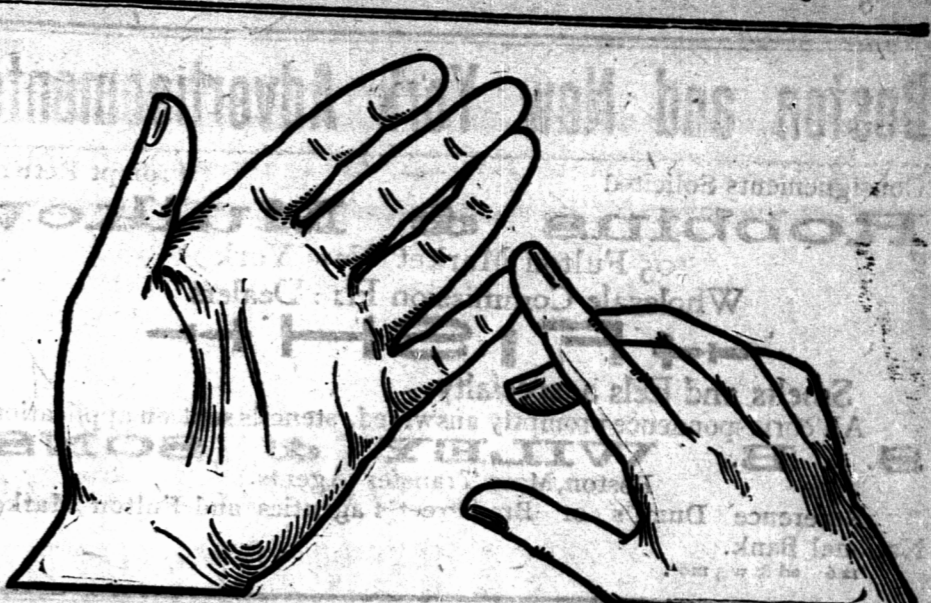
