Says Germans Will Guard

(Continued from Page 1) parliaments of the nations concerned.

"The Government of the Reich hopes that the Reichstag will pass the laws that will be submitted here looking toward our part of the necessary building. Nevertheless, the Reichstag has a solemn duty in determining whether it will associate itself with the Government's attitude."

The Chancellor repeated pointedly: "We are very hopeful of acquiescence, and passage of the laws."

Hopes for Future. The Chancellor then turned to discussion of the future in the light of favorable action by the Reichstag.

"With the passage of the necessary legislation," he declared, "Germany will devote herself to work with renewed courage and energy."

"Germany has been working beyond question in the past, but her arms have been crippled by economic depression for which the Ruhr occupation was partly responsible."

"In view of the heavy harsh burdens in the form of cash payments and deliveries in kind envisaged through the Dawes plan, courage and energy are two of the prime requisites for Germany. But we are hopeful that a reparations loan will instill fresh blood into our economic veins. Here our hopes turn above all toward America."

Looks Toward U. S. The Chancellor spoke with rising emphasis, "Your country may not be satisfied with having delivered the architect's blue-prints; it must also offer its share of the actual labor of building if the immense scheme is not to be checked in its initial stages. We hope it will be particularly through the U. S. that the plan will be carried to complete success."

"For her part, Germany will see to it that U. S. investors are not disappointed. Thus the walls will rise. "And the purpose of our structure must be a permanent understanding of the peoples of the world in the interest of the progress of mankind."

Father MacDonald treated the company to cigars after which good-byes were said and the thanks of the party extended to the pastor and to the people whom he had called together.

After a drive through Cardigan the party drove to Montague where a sumptuous supper was enjoyed at the MacDonald Hotel. They arrived in Charlottetown about 9.30 all delighted with the days outing and the Hebridean delegates loud in their praises of what they had seen of Prince Edward Island.

This morning they will be escorted to Belfast and after their enjoyable tour they will be driven to Bordet whence they leave for their tour through New Brunswick.

Brothers Are Shot By New York Gang

(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—Two men were shot to death yesterday in what police termed a "rumor" of the chicken war which has raged fiercely on both sides of the Hudson up seven years ago when the authorities brought temporary peace by sending several gang leaders to the electric chair after a series of violent murders. Today's victims marked the third murder of the resumed warfare in two days.

They were William Young, 28, and his friend Edward Conolly, who were fatally shot by a band of thugs operating from a taxi-cab. James Young, William's 27-year-old brother, was shot to death at about the same place and hour and in similar manner yesterday.

The Young brothers were to have appeared next month to testify against the murderers of an older brother, John, killed by a gunman in his Westchester, N. Y., saloon last March. The brothers were said to have been the only witnesses.

(Continued from Page 1) CONNAUGHT RANGES, Aug. 22.—Four Islanders got into second stage of Governor Generals, Corp. George MacDonald, Eight Signal Company with ninety seven. Sergt. A. McCabe ninety six. Sergt. Kennedy, ninety five. Capt. George Brown ninety two. With better weather conditions prevailing the riflemen fought through tricky mists with high scores for coveted places. The Governor General's first stage, which was won with a score of one hundred and two points, twenty seven scores of ninety one shot off for the last three places. (Continued from Page 1) From the moment that any such action is taken by a revolutionary group it is considered condemned by us to be immediately despatched.

This document, headed by a Hindu goddess Kali, "The Destroyer," slaying a European, is printed on cheap paper and was posted to several officers at private addresses which were supposed to be unknown. In addition to the posted copies, a large number of leaflets were posted on the walls of public buildings and on lamp standards during the night.

Mr. Tegart, the Commissioner of Police, who was recently the object of several attempts of assassination, says that despite the probability that the extremist press will dismiss the leaflet as a hoax or the idle threat of a few lunatics, he considers the matter one of serious importance. Not since 1915, when a succession of outrages followed, have such leaflets been issued.

That what has been done within the short space of ten months, more than half of which was snow clad winter is an indication of efficiency and a promise of a fruitful future must be admitted by all whose judgment can appreciate the extent of what they have been obliged to undertake.

We further approve the reforms of the legislative session, the adoption of business hours and business methods, the revision of ill-devised and ill-prepared laws and the passing of important acts for the better government of the country, all of which should meet with a satisfactory acceptance from the electorate which entrusted to them the duties of administration.

RESOLVED, that in our opinion

the Canadian tariff on Agricultural products should in all cases be increased at least up to the rates in force against our products entering the United States, and that the most stringent regulations should be enforced against the fraudulent exploitation of the name and reputation of the hog and meat products of Canada.

Several matters pertaining to the organization were fully discussed by the meeting. A motion that the federal nomination convention be held as early as possible was referred to the executive.

The public meeting for the discussion of political matters held in the Strand Theatre last night, following the annual business meeting of the Queens County Liberal Conservative Association in the afternoon, was productive of interesting addresses on provincial and federal affairs, the chief speaker being Hon. Dr. S. F. Toimie, ex-Minister of Agriculture and Dominion organizer of the Liberal Conservative party.

Owing to the visit of the Hebridean delegates to the province this week Premier Stewart and other members of the Provincial Government were unable to be present at the opening of the meeting. The Premier's arrival later in the evening was greeted with warm applause.

Mr. W. A. Stewart, president of the Queens County Liberal Conservative Association, presided last night and after a few introductory remarks called upon Hon. Dr. W. J. P. McMillan, who explained that owing to the pressure of other matters it has been difficult at the present time to organize political meetings. He had just received a phone message from the Premier stating that the visiting party from the Hebrides are so far delighted with what they have seen of Prince Edward Island.
