EXCITEMENT IN HOUSE OF COMMONS.

—LONDON, June 25—Intense embitterment has been engendered in England by the forcible feeding of the imprisoned suffragettes who declared a hunger strike while in jail. This was reflected in an extraordinary scene this afternoon in the house of commons, when George Lansbury, a socialist member, denounced Premier Asquith and the government in such vitriolic terms that he was ordered to leave the house by the speaker, who threatened to have him ejected unless he went out voluntarily.

Timothy Healy, the nationalist, had appealed to Premier Asquith the release the women, and the premier replied that they could leave the prison this afternoon on undertaking not to repeat their offense.

Mr. Lansbury immediately projected himself at the treasury bench, shaking his fist in the faces of Premier Asquith and the other ministers.

With his face only a few inches from that of Mr. Asquith, Mr. Lansbury screamed: "You are beneath contempt. You know the women cannot give such an undertaking. It is dishonourable to ask them to do so. Talk of Russian atrocities, why you will go down to history as the torturers and murderers of innocent women. You ought to be driven out of office. The house was quickly in disorder. The speaker, however, finally secured quiet and ordered Mr. Lansbury to leave. He replied:

"I am not going out while these contemptible things are torturing and murdering women.

He yelled this out in a loud voice and appeared to be much overpowered, but when the speaker warned him that he would be forcibly thrown out unless he went out of his own accord, the labor members gathered about their colleague and induced him to be quiet.

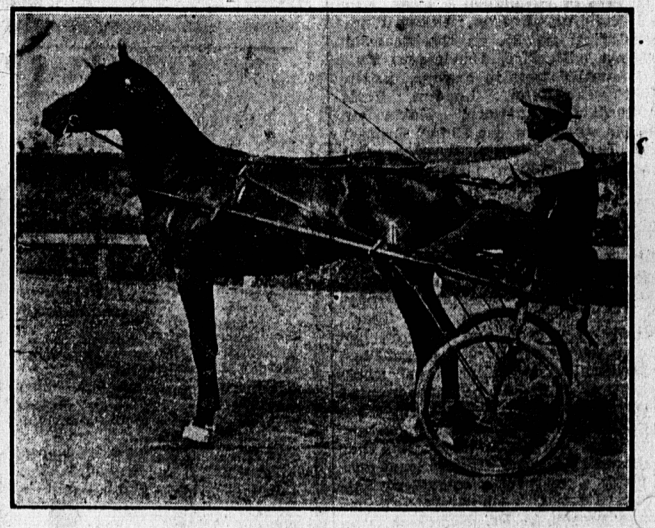

PETER CONROY AS A TRAINER

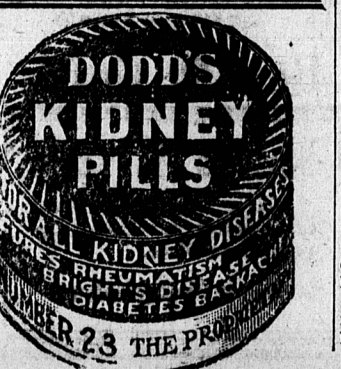
Charlottetown is fortunate at the Hilda S. 2.20; and others. That Mr. Conroy is making good with these is shown by the excellent trials which they are giving in work-outs. One week a write-up was given Mr. Cameron and his methods, and today The Guardian is furnishing its readers with a short account of Mr. Conroy. Mr. Conroy has been training horses for quite a number of years. He is a

blacksmith by profession, and therein lies the secret of much of his success with speed merchants. His first attempt was with Money Maker, who came into his hands direct from the plough. His initial work-out scarcely showed three minutes speed. He was rough gaited and altogether not a very promising candidate for honors. Under the pilotage of Mr. Conroy he developed in speed rapidly, winning race after race, and in his four-year-old form, making a mark of 2.18, which was the record for four-year-old geldings. Mr. Conroy's success was continued with many other lesser lights in the harness world, but perhaps his greatest success was achieved with the now celebrated Baby Logan in her five-year-old form. This mare starting out practically green climbed up race after race, making a mark of 2.18, and winning nearly \$700.00 in purses. She was the favorite on every race track where she appeared and countless thousands gave their tribute of admiration and hearty cheers as she crossed the line. If Mr. Conroy had nothing to commend him more than his success with these two horses, he would stand out as a pilot of equine flesh second to few in the Maritime Provinces, but there are many others, which space does not enable one to mention, which have improved and taken low marks under his careful trainership. This year he has located in the Charlottetown Driving Park with a splendid string of seven horses including the great George Crescens, three-year-old record 2.27, the excellent pacing mare

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 24.—Led by three young girls a demonstration which threatened to develop into a riot was precipitated on Saturday night by friends and sympathizers of the four Magnolias Mexican



Liberals, following a conviction for violation of the United States neutrality laws in the Federal Court. Only the presence of the United States Marshals, Deputy-Sheriffs and police in force prevented a storming of the Los Angeles county jail, where the four defendants, Ricardo Flores, Mangon Enrique, Magnon Liberado Rivera and Ansel Motigero, were placed in confinement, after the jury returned a verdict of guilty, to great sentence, which is to be pronounced Tuesday.

Ricardo Mangon and Rivera were found guilty on four counts each, Enrique Mangon on one count, and Motigero on one count. The indictments against them charged conspiracy to transport arms and men from the United States to Mexico at the time of the uprising against President Diaz.

The maximum penalty is two years imprisonment or ten thousand dollars fine, or both, and each count may be considered a separate offence.

THE CHICOUTIMI FIRE.

CHICOUTIMI, Que., June 25—The fire which raged through yesterday in this town did damage to the extent of \$2,500,000. Only one-third is covered by insurance.

The beautiful cathedral, the Hotel Saguenay and hundreds of houses were destroyed, while 5,000 families are without homes.

It is thought that the conflagration was started by an overheated stove in the Hotel Saguenay. The flames leaped from the hotel to the cathedral steeple. With a high wind and poor water supply the fire rapidly spread thru the whole town and ultimately consumed it. There was no loss of life. Financial help is being asked for.
