The annual meeting of the Red Cross Society was held yesterday afternoon in Mr. Justice Haszard's office, law courts building. The attendance was small. Those present included, the president, Mr. Justice Haszard, the secretary, Colonel S. R. Jenkins, M. D., and Mr. D. A. McKinnon, who each submitted reports, which will appear in a later issue.

Others present were Rev. Canon Simpson, Rev. Dr. Fullerton, Colonel Moore, Mr. Percy Pope, Mr. A. W. Sterns, Mrs. Haszard and Mrs. (Col) Jenkins.

The Secretary also read reports from a large number of the branches of the Society in different parts of the province all showing that much good work was being done by these.

The report of the Prisoners of War Department, Red Cross Society, was submitted and read by Rev. Canon Simpson as follows:

ANNUAL REPORT, Prisoners of War Department, Red Cross Society, Charlottetown, Nov. 9, 1916.

The Prisoners of War Fund was begun in a small way last Christmas, when the congregation of St. Peter's Cathedral donated a collection amounting to \$80.57. In January the Sunday School of the same church undertook to adopt a prisoner, by paying \$4.00 per month, for which sum he received a weekly box of goods through the London Branch of the Canadian Red Cross. —RED CROSS.—The Carleton, Cape Traverse, and Augustine Cove people have contributed liberally to the Red Cross Society. Over a hundred Christmas stockings were packed and shipped to the boys at the front. Extensive plans have been made for the winter's work.

—CAPE TRAVERSE seems to lead the island for market prices. The road are lined with teams hauling produce to the wharf. Lord's Co. are doing a big business in potatoes and hogs. Also dealers coming from New Brunswick are paying from 68 to 75 cents per bushel.

—GOOSE SUPPER.—Seldom has Cape Traverse seen a busier day than Tuesday, Nov. 7, 1916, when the good women of that place and vicinity assembled at the new hall, decorating and preparing for the goose supper which was served in the evening. This proved a decided success both socially and financially, the sum of \$160 being realized. Over three hundred persons coming from all parts of the surrounding country were served in the Masonic Hall on the second floor. Down stairs the visitors were entertained with music and other pastimes. One part of the splendid building was made interesting with a "grab box." All the articles were valuable and created great fun among the children. On one side of the stage the school girls presided over a beautifully decorated candy table. The money realized goes toward the completion of the new building which is so far free of debt.

—SPECIAL SERVICES.—The week of special services held at Springfield in connection with the Methodist church came to an end on Sunday evening when the following routine took place: Hymn, "All Hail the Power," hymn, "Come Ye Sinners," Prayer by Mrs. (Rev.) The pastor then gave a talk on "Heaven" which was followed by a special hymn by the choir. The series of meetings according to all reports have been of great benefit. 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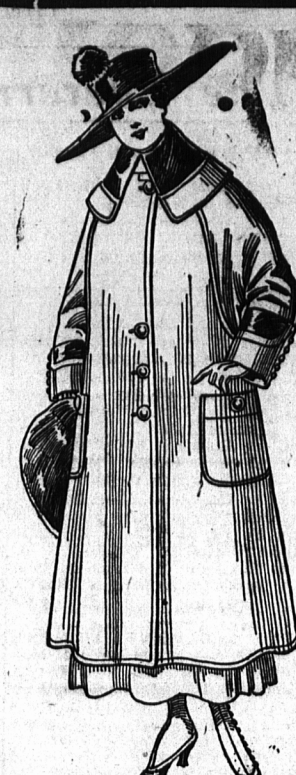
