Jack Miner May Visit Province

Jack Miner, world famous lecturer and naturalist will appear at one of the local theatres here early in May, giving one of his celebrated illustrated lectures; that is, if present plans mooted by the Publicity and Fish and Game Association materialize, and from present indications it looks as if Miner will be here.

Yesterday afternoon representatives from the above mentioned Associations met in the Chambers of Mr. Justice Arsenault, Law Courts Building, to talk over ways and means of having Mr. Miner come here during his tour of the Maritimes, which is greatly anticipated by the various cities and towns which he is already booked for.

Justice Arsenault, who presided over the meeting informed those present that the Prince Edward Island Publicity Association has undertaken to defray expenses and that a nominal admission fee would be charged, in order to cover same. His Lordship added that he was privileged to hear Jack Miner on two different occasions and would be willing to go some distance to hear him again. He said he was different from most lectures, in so far that he did not speak from notes. He was just a big boy, a lover of nature and the great outdoors, who started a sanctuary in 1904, in fact one of the first of its kind. It was three years before he attracted the first bird, and now thousands frequent his place and all the feathered creatures know him. Miner is 62 years of age and is known as "Canada's great bird man." He has crossed the Continent five times and has spoken to over 200,000 people; in Toronto an attendance of 18,000 heard him lecture in one night.

The point was stressed at the meeting that Mr. Miner's appearance here would not only be of educational value to the children but to adults as well; he is very descriptive and all his lectures are intensely interesting and instructive; therefore it is sincerely hoped that the above mentioned Associations will succeed in bringing this well known lecturer to the Province.

USED GOOD CARS

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., March 26.—The inquiry from foreign buyers for Canadian grain here today was of a very disappointing character and the volume of business was small. The domestic trade was also dull but prices were unchanged. Prices for all grades of spring and winter wheat flour were firmly maintained under a quiet demand. The undertone to the market for all lines of millfeed was strong under a continued urgent demand from all sources. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was steady and values were unchanged. The weakness which characterized the local egg situation for the most part of the last week was again in evidence today and prices scored another decline of one cent per dozen. This was due to the increased offerings from the interior and the prospects for large receipts this week. The receipts were 1,911 cases. A feature of the potato trade was the weaker feeling that developed and prices were reduced ten to fifteen cents per bag. This was attributed to the heavy arrivals and the small demand. The butter trade was extremely dull but the undertone was firm. The receipts were 43 packages. A moderate amount of business was done in cheese and prices ruled firm. The receipts were 98 boxes. T. J. Coleman, St. Stephen, N. B.

Winnipeg—Lower prices were reported over the weekend from Moose Jaw, Swift Current and Brandon. The range of paying prices at these centres extras 26-28 cents; firsts 24-26 cents; seconds 20-21 cents.

OTTAWA, Ont., March 26.—Further declines in egg prices have been reported from a number of markets over the weekend and prices are now rapidly approaching the storage basis.

TORONTO.—The egg market here is again lower and dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 30-32; firsts 28-30 cents; seconds 23-25 cents. Prices to retailers are extras 36-37; firsts 34-35 cents; seconds 30 cents. Country shippers report that production is increasing fast.

MONTREAL.—The egg market here is holding fairly steady at the recent decline. Dealers are paying for local ungraded eggs extras 34 cents; firsts 31-32 cents; seconds 27-29 cents.
