**DRIVEN ASHORE
IN THE STORM**

Amid Waves that Were Sweeping Mast High

Four Men Perish and Vessel Dashed to Pieces Within Hundred Yards From Lighthouse

SCHOONER DRIVEN ASHORE:
WOOD'S HOLE, MASS., Nov. 13.—(Special)—The schooner Arcularius of Rockland in today's fierce storm was driven ashore on the rocks at Tarpaubin Cove.

RESCUE IMPOSSIBLE:
The light keeper states that the seas mast high dashed over the vessel, making any attempt at rescuing the crew impossible.

FOUR MEN PERISHED:
Four men composed the crew and were plainly seen early, but darkness set in and they have undoubtedly perished.

SCHOONER DASHED TO PIECES:
The schooner was dashed to pieces not a hundred yards from the lighthouse.

**TWO SUCCESSIVE
RUSSIAN ONSETS**

Repulsed by Japanese Wit Small Losses

Russian Bombardment Growing Weaker—Port Arthur Had a Quiet Sunday Yesterday

RUSSIAN ATTACK REPULSED.
JAPANESE HEADQUARTERS, Nov. 13.—(Special)—The Russians attacked the left of the Japanese army on Saturday morning but were repulsed.

A PREVIOUS ATTACK.
Previously five hundred Russians had attacked in the direction of Senozaiton but were repulsed.

LOSSES WERE SMALL.
The Russian losses were about sixty. The Russian bombardment has lessened lately and little damage has been done by their shells, very few Japs being wounded and none killed.

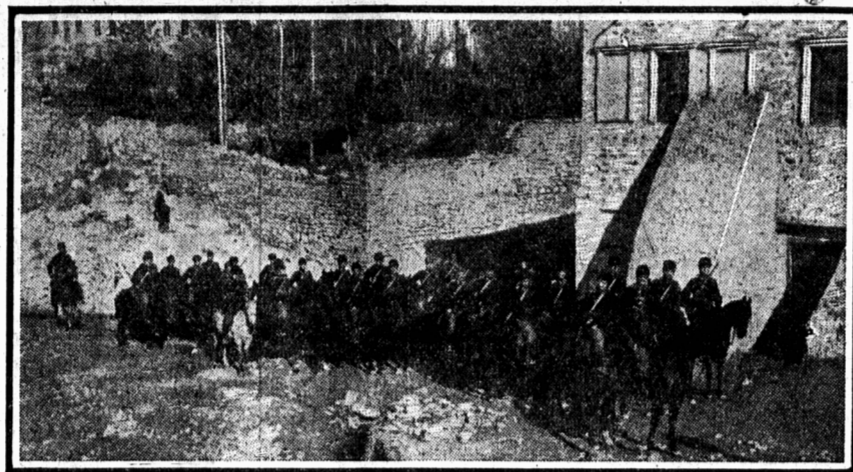
John McMillan told of his standing at the corner of Rochford and Grafton and hearing about the drunken man lying on the sidewalk. He went up to the spot with the other boys with him and found the murdered woman on the sidewalk.

Albert Moellette, engineer on the tug McKee, testified of having seen the man running from the scene of the murder as he was passing on the other side. He could not describe the man.

Catherine Higgins had passed warehouse a night previous to the murder and saw man standing there. Did not think it was Power now in Court. Mrs Higgins contradicted a statement made by her that a boy had called at her door telling her to take in her dog because crazy Power would shoot it.

Miss Maggie Ronaghan and Isabelle McDonald testified of passing the warehouse the night before the murder and seeing a man walking forward and backward on the opposite side of the street.

At noon the case was adjourned till today when the physicians and several other witnesses will be heard.

Two Young Men Hunting When Gun Discharged Breaking a Leg and Victim Dies of Shock—His Companion Stricken Dumb—Husband Cleaning Rifle Accidentally Shoots Wife Who Dies.

COMRADE ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.
ST. STEPHEN, N. B., Nov. 13.—(Special)—Saturday morning two young men, Earl Avery and Geo. McLean of Dufferin, went shooting and shortly afterwards, in some unknown manner, Avery's rifle was discharged and the ball entered McLean's left leg just above the knee, shattering the bone.

MCLEAN DIED SHORTLY AFTERWARDS.
Avery was given in charge and McLean taken home and Doctor Deinstadt summoned, but the young man died shortly afterwards without being able to explain how the accident occurred.

AVEERY IS SPEECHLESS.
Avery has an impediment in his speech and was so greatly shocked by the accident that he has not been able to speak since it happened.

**AN ISLAND GIRL
COMMITS SUICIDE**

Killed Herself by Taking Poison in Boston

In Despair Over an Unhappy Turn in a Love Affair She Drinks Carbolic Acid.

BOSTON, Nov. 11.—In despair over an unhappy turn in a love affair, Sadie McDermott, committed suicide last night by drinking carbolic acid.

Sadie McDermott was the daughter of Archibald McDermott, living in Charlottetown. She was born in Prince Edward Island, 21 years ago and came to Boston two years ago.

She went to work in the boarding house kept by Mrs. Dougall McIsaac, as table girl. Last winter a young man, one of the boarders, began to pay Miss McDermott attention, and the two have been much together.

Archibald McDermott said last night that the young man "left the house on Linwood place shortly before his daughter killed herself, but what took place between the girl and her sweetheart only the young man himself knows.

Whatever it was, it came as the culmination of several days of unhappiness for Sadie McDermott. Persons living in the house had noticed her recent lack of spirit and her utter despair.

Shortly after 8:30 a die called from her own room where she had been sitting alone, for Mrs. McIsaac, to come to her. Mrs. McIsaac responded, but when she reached the room and spoke to Miss McDermott got no answer. Mrs. McIsaac went back to her kitchen and Sadie ran out there, threw her arms about Mrs. McIsaac's neck and gasped "I've taken poison."

It was her supreme effort and she fell to the floor as her grasp relaxed with fading consciousness.
