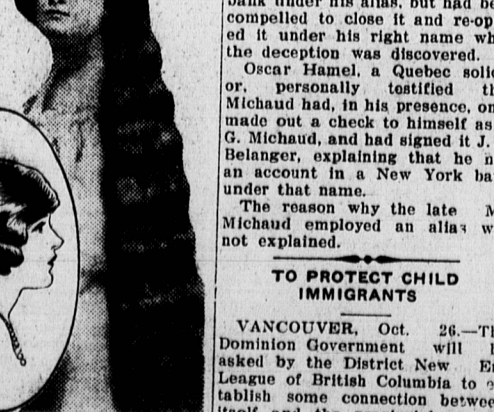
***SHIPPING**—The schooner Capt. Murphy, has arrived at the port of Montague with a cargo of Albin Nut from Pictou for Pottle & Thompson. After discharging this vessel will load produce for Sydney, returning with another cargo of coal. The Schooner Sea Foam is now loading oats and potatoes. The Silver Bell cleared for New Glasgow, with full cargo. Two Newfoundland vessels the Swan, Capt. Rogers and the Miriam May, Capt. Kirby, arrived on Saturday last, and will load general cargoes. Both vessels had a fine trip up. The captains of these vessels report a large exodus of people from Newfoundland during the past summer over twenty thousand leaving for Western Canada and the United States, due in a large measure to the failure of the fisheries and the low price of fish, making it almost impossible for the people to get along. The price of potatoes seems to have been definitely settled at forty-five cents per bushel, oats the same, and turnips twenty cents. J.

***A NEW CRISIS OVER THE REPARATIONS PROBLEM**

Paris, Oct. 28 Germany's formal application for a hearing before the reparations committee on the subject of her capacity to pay is considered in authoritative circles as having brought the whole reparations problem to a new crisis. The German request was contained in a note presented to the commission this afternoon by Dr. Meyer, head of the German reparations delegation in Paris. It is anticipated that it will bring up an issue between the French and British on one side and the Belgian and Italian representatives on the other, the three latter being in favor of hearing the Germans. The British and Italians have been inclined in this direction for some time, and the Belgians are now said to believe that the time has come when the Germans should be allowed to state their case.

M. Poincare, it is recalled, has all along contended that if any re-estimate of Germany's capacity to pay were made, it should be done by the reparations committee but he has hitherto avoided committing himself to whether the committee might properly make up that "question under the present circumstances." In his last interview with Herr Von Herzon the German Charge d'Affaires he declared he would not consent to consideration of any such questions by the commission until the passive resistance had ceased.

RENT BILL UNCOVERS FOR-TUNE

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—It was disclosed yesterday that the late Jos. George Michaud of Quebec had the sum of \$29,000 in U. S. bonds deposited in a strong box at the Lincoln Safe Deposit Co. in this city under the name of "J. A. Belanger."

This fact came to light when Surrogate John P. O'Brien was petitioned by Georgian Richard Julien of Montreal to turn this money over to her as executrix of Michaud's estate.

Michaud, according to the police, died in Quebec, December 12, 1919, but the existence of the money was not known until a bill for the rent of the strong box for two years, made out by the Lincoln Trust Co. to J. A. Belanger, accidentally reached the petitioner. According to the deposition of Arthur Mautte, manager of the Banque Nationale, Quebec, Michaud had placed an account at the bank under his alias, but had been compelled to close it and re-open it under his right name, when the deception was discovered.

Oscar Hamel, a Quebec solicitor, personally testified that Michaud had, in his presence, once made out a check to himself as J. G. Michaud, and had signed it J. A. Belanger, explaining that he had an account in a New York bank under that name.

The reason why the late Mr. Michaud employed an alias was not explained.

GERHARDY DIED FROM WOUNDS

AKRON, O., Oct. 26.—Fred W. Gerhardy, of Detroit, prominent race track official, died in a hospital here tonight from wounds received Saturday when he was shot by Marlon Webb, a trainer. His son, Fred W. Jr., and Mrs. Gerhardy were at his bedside.

Peter Cullen, Toronto, another official who was shot at the same time, was reported on the road to recovery.

Gerhardy was sixty years old. He was shot twice, one bullet passing through his breast and the second through his arm. He appeared to be improving until today when his condition suddenly took a turn for the worse.

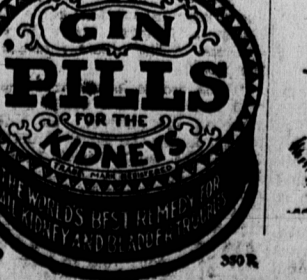
An autopsy was held tonight. The body will be taken to Detroit by his widow and son tomorrow. Funeral services will be held there Saturday afternoon.

Deputies at the jail said they would not inform Webb of the death until tomorrow when, police announced, he will be charged with first degree murder. He is held without bond on a charge of shooting to kill.
