Several other persons were unavoidably absent. Premier Arsenault was in Summerside, and Mr. Bell was in the country. Messrs. Nicholson and Simons had not returned from Ottawa. Messrs. Martin and Nash were otherwise occupied. Judge Macdonald was detained by the illness of the Governor. Lt. Col. Jenkins and Mr. P. S. Brown found it impossible to leave town. The weather was perfect and the journey down and up as well as the entertainment was much enjoyed.

**Second Class Station Wanted at Milton**

Mr. Amos Rodd, North Milton, draws attention to the necessity for improved station accommodation at Milton. A great deal of produce is shipped from the neighborhood and formerly was hauled to town. The farmers now consider that as they get the same price in Milton as they do in the city, the railway authorities should provide the necessary facilities for shipping f. o. b. Milton. They do not want a telegraph office, but consider that a second class station with the usual sheds should be provided in place of the present siding.

**THE KALAMAZOO MEETING**

KALAMAZOO, MICH., July 12.—Thirteen of the nineteen races programmed for the Grand Circuit meeting, which opens at Recreation Park Tuesday, will be raced over the mile track. Seven of them are also early closing events, in which the horses that appeared at Cleveland will take the word.  
The Rickman Hotel \$2,000. Purse for 2:13 pacers is the feature event for the first day of the meeting, and it looks as though Geers would win it with Goldie Hal. Her three miles at Cleveland in 2:04 1/4, 2:04 3/4, 2:06 1/4 was a high class performance. She will also be forced to step that fast to win here from Darvester if he should be started in it, as well as Eva Abbe, Sanard and Flora A.  
The free-for-all pacers will parade on Wednesday, the list of eligible candidates being Directum J., Lillian T., Single G., and Peter Nash. It will be sandwiched with the three year old trot in which Andrews will no doubt appear behind Abbie Puntney with which he won at Cleveland, in 2:06 1/2 while the other starters will include Brusloff with which Murphy forced him out, King Stout and Peter L.  
The Paper Mill \$3,000. Purse for the 2:06 trotters will also be decided on the second day. As at Cleveland it will result in another struggle between Royal Mack, Peter June, Busy's Lassie and Miss Perfection with the Toddler and either Mack Forbes or Prince Loree added. At Cleveland Murphy won with Royal Mack in 2:07 1/4 after dropping a heat to Geers. He will be forced to step faster than that to stall off Stinson with the Toddler or McDewitt with the selection from the Shaw stable providing Cox does not make trouble for all of them with Busy's Lassie.  
The Columbia Hotel \$3,000. Purse for the 2:13 trotters should prove a very fast race as it will bring out Mary Coburn, Fenesta, Harvest Tide Peter Coley, McGregor the Great and Hilda Fletcher. At Cleveland Peter Coley won in 2:07 1/4, Fenesta in 2:06 1/4. Harvest Tide forcing her out while Mary Coburn made Allie Lou trot in 2:14 to win the first heat of the Ohio Purse.  
The Burdick Hotel \$2,000. Purse for 2:06 pacers cannot fail to prove a stubborn battle between Frank Dewey if he came out of his Cleveland race in good form and the Tennessee terror Grace Direct which after making a sweep over the half mile tracks since the last week in May landed in front at the first time of asking on a mile track in 2:04 1/4. Frank Dewey also won in the same notch after dropping a couple of heats while O. U. C. Jay Mack, Darvester, Symbol Baron and Read Bearer all of which are named to start showed almost as fast at Cleveland.
