## Inferior Specimen From Hawaii

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, July 11.—The seventh instalment of the sale of the world's greatest stamp collection has contributed £21,400 to the grand total of £170,000 realized by the auction of the Ferrari treasures in Paris.  
The figure is exclusive of the Government tax of 17 1/2 per cent. The leading stamp buyers of Europe and America were again represented, including the King's agent. The highest figure reached by any one lot was £1,557. It was paid for an inferior specimen of the rare two cent "missionary" stamp of the Hawaiian Islands, 1851 type II, of which only half a dozen copies is believed to exist. A four penny stamp of South Australia, 1867, printed in error in blue instead of purple, realized £150. Some of the best prices were paid for scarce varieties of the United States, notably the picture issue of 1869, with the cent red printed upside down, of which the 15c sold for £165, 21c for £48 and 30c for £442. A relic of the Civil War in an emergency five cent stamp of Unionville, S. C., brought £228. At least five more sales will be required to disperse this marvellous accumulation of rare stamps.
