

Canadiens Snowed Under By Hawks

CHICAGO, Feb. 22—(CP)—Chicago's Black Hawks extended their own undefeated streak to eight games and tied Boston for the season's high-scoring record in the National Hockey League by defeating the hapless Montreal Canadiens tonight 10-1. A crowd of 11,675 persons saw the wild contest which brought injuries to two players—Defenceman Art Wiebe of Chicago and Goalie Wilf Cude of Montreal. Wiebe suffered a wrenched knee. Cude aggravated an old shoulder injury and had to leave the ice with five minutes to go in the second period and the Hawks leading 5-0.

Charlie Sands, Canadiens forward, donned Cude's pads and made a valiant stand but despite added efforts by his mates, the Hawks trained in five more goals.

The Hawk management announced Bill Mackenzie would be recalled from Providence to replace Wiebe and added that Mike Karakas, its suspended goalie, had been given permission to play with Canadiens for the remainder of the season.

Frank Calder, President of the league, will be asked by the Hawks to lift Karakas' suspension so that he can join Canadiens.

Rookies Johnny Chad and Phil Hergesheimer each got two goals to lead the Hawks. Louis Trudel collected the only Canadian score in the final period.

Boston scored its record 10 goals Feb. 13, defeating Detroit 10-3.

Manager Jules Dugal first announced Claude Bourque probably would be recalled from New Haven to replace Cude. It was indicated that Bourque might be used against the Rangers at New York Sunday, but that Karakas, suspended several weeks ago for refusing to play with the Hawks Providence farm, would finish out the season for the Canadiens.

LONDON, Feb. 22—(CP CABLE)—Leading aircraft man Alec House of the Royal Air Force tonight defeated Corporal Roye Gilford of St. Catharines Ont., in their boxing contest at Wembley Stadium. House scored a technical knockout in the second round of a three rounder. Each had won a contest in their two previous meetings.

The King was present to see the services boxing show in aid of the Red Cross. Four boxers from the French Army participated.

Gilford, with the 10th Field Battery, Royal Canadian Artillery, was born at Mexborough, York-shire, and was a boxer's son. He went to Canada as a child. He hopes to meet House again but the war is his primary consideration.

First Place At Stake In S.D.U. Versus U.N.B. Clash At Forum Tonight

Father Oswald Murphy's Red and White warriors of St. Dunstan's University face the "acid" test tonight when they meet the University of New Brunswick team at the Forum tonight in the scheduled game of the western section of the Maritime Intercollegiate Hockey League.

Sharing the top spot with tonight's visiting squad Saints by a victory can gain a clear cut lead over the pack in the race for sectional honors. U. N. B. come to town with a record, having two draws and one victory against one defeat in four games while the Saints have piled up two wins out of the three games they have played. Due to the point system in vogue however each squad will enter the fray with 4 points apiece to their credit.

The game should be a natural from whatever angle one would choose to view it. Both teams in games to date have displayed that they have a little something on the other squads comprising the loop and the battle should be a fast, amusing and close struggle from the opening whistle until the final one. Saints enter the struggle with the psychological advantage of having already beaten the U. N. B. team the victory being gained on the S. D. U. square rink trip. If they can repeat it will mean a long stride towards clinching the section title as a victory would put them parity in the drivers seat with a game in hand over their closest challengers.

And it will be one of the most determined red and white squads ever to take the ice that will oppose the visitors tonight. Daily practice session together with a game against P. W. C. have pretty well ironed out the flaws that was so noticeable in early season games and Coach Father Murphy is confident that his charges will give their finest performance against last year's intercollegiate Maritime titlists in tonight's game at the Forum.

The visitors as usual have come up with a fast, smooth-skating tricky squad on a par with last year's edition and will be out for revenge for the defeat Saints handed them in St. John's. Tonight's beat when the "chips" are down the New Brunswick squad can be expected to make the Saints travel fast every step of the way all through the game and if Saints do manage to emerge the victors it will only be after the toughest sort of an ice battle.

The game will get underway at 8:30 o'clock sharp and with the large crowd of city fans expected to sit in plus the addition of nearly 100 percent attendance from the Island University it would not be surprising if tonight's attendance will exceed anything yet to witness a game at the Island's sport Forum.

S'side Crystals Preparing For Playoff Games

With the Summerside Intermediate Crystals getting two workouts daily under their belt, and rounding into the pink of condition, it looks as if the team that knocked them out of the playoffs will have to be on their toes all the time. Coach Cahill has been giving their stiff sessions and thinks he has them "clicking" at last.

This year's intermediate squad are favorites to capture the Maritime crown which has been held by the Victoria Unions these last few years and the Unions are not competing this year.

They have a fast-stepping trio who performed last year with the Junior Capitals. The three, along with a few of the old "warrior" boys from last year's senior Crystals and the new faces from Charlottetown who should be a big addition to this year's outfit. Maple Leafs Strengthen Grip On Third Place

DETROIT, Feb. 22—(CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs strengthened their grip on third place in the National Hockey League standings by turning back Detroit Red Wings 2-1 before a crowd of 8,254 spectators here tonight while both teams Hockey opportunists, the Leafs made the most of their scoring chances in counting once in the first period and again in the second.

The victory was the fifth the Leafs have scored over Detroit this season. The Red Wings have won one and tied one in the intra-club rivalry.

The speedy Toronto sextet took the lead never to let it go in the opening minutes of the first stanza when Hank Goltup fired the puck in to the open net to complete a beautiful play in which Lex Chisholm and Pete Langelle also participated.

Early in the second period Toronto scored its last goal, "Red" Heron slapping in a rebound of a shot by Walter Stanowski. Chisholm, who had carried the puck into pay territory, also got an assist.

Detroit got its lone goal midway of the third period while both teams were short-handed as a result of a hurry between Jimmy Orlando of Detroit, and Reginald (Red) Horner of the Leafs.

The score was made by Ebbie Goodfellow on a drive from 30 feet that whizzed over goalie Walter (Turk) Brodie's right shoulder. Syd Howe and Alex Motter drew assists on the play.

AMERICANS SCORE FIRST VICTORY OF SEASON OVER N. Y. RANGERS

NEW YORK, Feb. 22—(CP)—Tommy Anderson's overtime goal gave New York Americans a 1-0 victory over their city rivals, the Rangers, tonight in a National hockey league game. It was Americans first victory of the season and strengthened their chances of reaching the playoffs.

It took Anderson's goal after a minute's play in overtime and Earl Robertson's superlative goaltending to turn the trick. The Rangers, leader of the National League lead with Boston Bruins had beaten the sixth-place Americans five times and tied them once before this upset. Anderson took a pass from Hooley Smith, beat past Art Coulter and fired under Dave Kerr as the goalie dived to break up the heavy-bumper fast-breaking thriller. The game's star was Robertson, a dynamo who stemmed wave after wave of Ranger assaults.

There was one there was a dozen shots that it seemed impossible for Robertson to handle but he got there every time, with his stick, skate or body. The fan gave him an ovation between the third and overtime periods.
