THE PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION.

By the death of President McKinley, Vice President Roosevelt becomes President for the remainder of the term in accordance with the following provision of the constitution of the United States:

In case of the removal of the President from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the Vice President, etc.

On assuming the office of President Mr. Roosevelt has taken the oath of office and must call a session of Congress, giving twenty days' notice. The members of the present Cabinet will tender their resignations and the new President may re-appoint them, or one or more of their number, or in his discretion choose an entirely new Cabinet. In all cases where a Vice President has thus succeeded to the Chief Magistracy he has lived out the balance of the term, but provision is also made for the death or disability of a Vice President who so succeeds. In the case of the death of Mr. Roosevelt before the expiration of the term the Secretary of State would become President. The next in order of succession would be the Secretary of the Treasury, the Secretary of War, Attorney General, Postmaster General, Secretary of the Navy, and Secretary of the Interior.

It will thus be seen that the succession is fully provided for, so as to prevent the possibility of a break in the administrative headship of the nation. The provisions last above cited did not exist in the Constitution but were enacted by the Forty-ninth Congress to meet the new conditions and dangers which had arisen.

The supposed complicity of Emma Goldman in the murder of the President rests in the first place upon the statement of the murderer himself. He has told that he heard her lecture in Cleveland, and she "set him on fire" with her teaching that all rulers ought to be exterminated. Czolgosz and Goldman are known to have met also in Chicago, and in Pittsburg on August 18 the woman was known to have been met by a young man bearing a strong resemblance to Czolgosz. What further evidence the police may have has not yet been disclosed.

Fullerton preached an eloquent sermon taking his text from Sam. 1:14, "Thou wast not afraid to stretch forth thy hand to destroy the Lord's anointed." The preacher made special reference to the death of the late President McKinley, eulogizing his exemplary life as a great statesman, good ruler, and above all a God-fearing Christian man. In closing his remarks he touchingly made reference to the two young lives so lately removed by death, that of Louise MacKay and Sidney Perkins, both of whom were dearly beloved by the young and old of St. James' congregation. The service throughout was most solemn and impressive. During the offertory, the choir sang "Asleep in Jesus" and as a concluding voluntary the organist rendered the "Dead March in Saul."

Manitoba Harvest Fields.

Continued from first page. City Hospital, Post Office, Imperial Bank of Canada, Immigration Office. Land offices of the C. P. R., also the city Hall which is a very pretty building and has before it a public square, in which is a monument in honor of seven young men who fell in the North West Rebellion of '85. Proceeding further west we arrive at our destination at Neepawa, a very busy little town, which has three grain elevators, that are now buzzing from early morn till late at night. This section of southern Manitoba is a great wheat growing country and has immense crops of wheat this season. Its yield is estimated from 35 to 40 bushels to the acre. Farmers who came to this section of the country about ten years ago, with nothing on their minds, to start out on, have now fine farm buildings with farm-machinery and the best horses and cattle that can be found in the west, or perhaps all that one could wish for.

The cutting of the wheat is pretty well through now and threshing has just got thoroughly under way. There are a lot of steam threshers out here now, more have been imported this year than ever before. The greater number are purchased in Ontario, some, however, are from the United States.

A twenty-five horse power thresher will thresh about 2,000 bushels of grain, and that is counted a good day's work, working from 7 a. m. to 7.30 p. m. The number of hands required to run this machine are 25. Threshing generally lasts well on in November, but as there are a larger number of machines used this season than before, it is expected to be through earlier if the weather keeps dry and fine as it is at present.

This is the country for anyone who has a desire for farm land which can be had at \$10 an acre, in quarter sections, half sections, etc. Quarter sections consist of 100 acres and can be bought at reasonable terms.

To hire by the month laborers get from \$35 to \$45 a month. By the day to work on farm they get \$1.50 per day; to work on thresher, pitchers get \$1.50 to \$1.75; Engineer \$3.50; Firemen \$2.00, and stook teams \$3.50.
