SHALL CHARLOTTETOWN HAVE AN AERO CLUB?

Here, where the airship is not yet in evidence, the possible utility of the flying machine is yet considerably in doubt. Our own Dr. J. G. Schurman, loaned to Cornell University, which he serves as President, has opinions on the subject which may be valued by his fellow Islanders. Dr. Schurman has recently returned from Europe where he witnessed some exhibitions of aerial progress and is very optimistic as to the future of aviation as a medium of sport and recreation. His vision differs from that of the late lamented Laureate in this. He sees not the heavens filled with commerce, or with fighting ships grappling in the blue, but with aerial pleasure craft, tossed on the viewless billows in the pleasant sunshine.

In a word the aeroplane is to take the place of the motor car and the motor boat in sport and pastime, but with a difference, for neither snow-drifts nor ice-floes will obstruct its progress in winter, nor will the mud or slush do so in the springtime. Wherefore the young men of wealth and leisure will abandon the road and the river, the solid earth and the water, to become yachtsmen of the air. Dr. Schurman finds satisfaction in the thought that the roads will then be left free and safe to the public who remain content to drive a horse or travel on Shank's mare. Here we have no need for such liberation of the roads as the Legislature has kept them free for the exclusive use of muscular-driven vehicles. But this affords the better reason for those who are denied the use of the autocar resorting to the aeroplane.

Wherefore it is time for our young men to bethink themselves of the formation of an Aero Club and the purchase of a flyer or two for next summer's recreation. The A. A. A. grounds would form a convenient home station for departure and alighting on return, and what better landing place could be desired than the broad beaches on the North Shore? A half hour's flight would cover the intervening distance. We may rest assured that the first successful flier over Island soil will bring others in its train, and then we shall have flying competitions, to be followed if not preceded by trips to the mainland. These things are coming, almost as surely as tomorrow's sun. It will be exciting sport, and utility may come close upon the heels of recreation. Charlottetown should lead the way. If it fails, the honor of being first is a notable twentieth century enterprise will fall to Summerside, or Souris or elsewhere.

Twenty years later he was a member of the Legislature. He has been in politics ever since. During thirty years' career as a public man he has done some good constructive work for the government of his Island home. His energies have been directed to agricultural improvements. He was the first Commissioner of Agriculture of Prince Edward Island. The little detached Province is probably the most fertile island for its size in the world. The fame of its oats, potatoes, and hay is due in no small way to Mr. Benjamin Rogers."

Mr. Rogers' many friends hope that some day a further and higher official promotion awaits him.

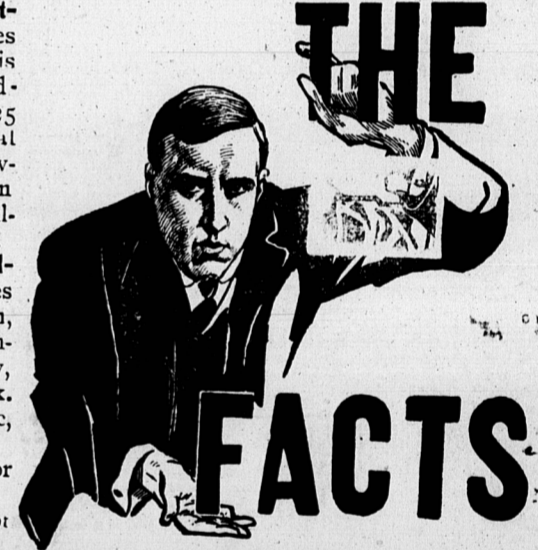
