

MYSTERIOUS MYSTERY AND SUICIDE OF MAN

Funeral About to Take Place Was Ordered Postponed Until Cleared Up.

PARIS, Nov. 27 (Special)—The mystery surrounding the strangling of a woman on the night of November 1 in the Bois de Boulogne has been solved in dramatic circumstances. The woman, Juliette Souavin, was discovered by two women, who, passing through the woods, saw a man kneeling on the ground frantically scraping out a grave with his hands. When observed he disappeared in the woods.

On the day following the Baron Gedella (trustee to the family of the late Ducand Duchesse de Bellane), who lived in the district, committed suicide. By his body was a letter stating: "I killed myself at 3.40 November 1, 1913."

The baron's funeral was just about to take place when Dr. Hochard, the police surgeon, ordered a postponement. He had been unable to sleep, he said, owing to a persistent impression that the circumstances of the baron's suicide ought to be cleared up. Medical proofs established that the baron's statement of the date of his death was correct.

The scratches on the baron's nails and fingers, the doctor thought, pointed to some connection with the murder of Juliette Souavin. This week it was established that he was with the woman in the Bois de Boulogne on the night of her death. The couple are supposed to have quarrelled, and in a moment of anger the baron is believed to have strangled her. Then, driven insane by fear, he tried to scratch a grave in which to hide the body, but took refuge in flight when disturbed.

GRIEVANCE OF THE UNEMPLOYED

LONDON, Nov. 27 (Special)—A fresh grievance has arisen among the men employed at the London docks, and the Port of London Authority will shortly be asked to consider certain cases of alleged victimization. Messrs H. Goaling and H. Orbell, who represent the men's unions on the Port Authority, are to raise the matter at a forthcoming meeting. The suggestion is that in many instances there has been a breach of faith on the question of reinstatement.

Mr. Williams, the secretary of the Transport Workers' Federation, stated on Saturday that the men claim there have been many cases of vindictive victimization on the part of the Port Authority. "We do not blame the Authority itself, but it is their minor officials who are said to be the authors of these instances. Messrs. Orbell and Goaling intend to try, as far as their powers will permit, to remedy the grievances. After the strike the men were to be reinstated in their former positions, but we have many cases of men who have not been employed again at their old rate. The grades have been shifted, and men who were in grade A have been put into grade B, while some classes as casuals. Many have had to seek employment elsewhere.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 26—(Special)—Much excitement is being caused here by a blackmail demand on the Russian violinist M. Ymay Mitnitsky, who is concert-touring in Denmark. The letter was typewritten in the Russian language and signed "The Black Hand."
M. Mitnitsky was ordered to send \$250 by mail to the Russian political fugitives in Denmark. If he refused, the letter said, "You will be assassinated by the Anarchist executive committee."

THE ELECTIONS IN RUSSIA

The Rights Have Absolute Majority, Prestige of The Church Undetermined

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 27 (Special)—The issue of the elections is now defined. The Right have an absolute majority in the Duma, and the Centre are curtailed and shorn of their leader, M. Guchkof. Although it is entirely artificial, such a transposition may be a logical historical necessity, inasmuch as it, doubtless, will forever discredit hopes of reaction, but for Russia at the present critical juncture of international affairs the electoral experiment carried out by M. Sabler and M. Harouin is a great misfortune. By using the clergy for base electoral purposes these representatives of the Synod and the Home Office in their zeal as courtiers have not only magnified the difficulties of the Government, but disastrously undermined the prestige of the Church. The Nationalists publicly denounce the electoral abuses and have withdrawn from the contest in many of the constituencies.

LONDON, Nov. 26 (Special)—A statement of the number of persons in receipt of relief in London on Saturday, October 19, shows that there were 106,170 paupers, of whom 74,176 were on the workhouses and 31,994 were on the outdoor lists, including 587 children boarded out beyond the unions and 12,520 other children under 16 years of age. This total was higher by 112 than that for the corresponding day of October, 1911, and represented a rate of 23.5 per 1,000 of the population.

BERLIN, Nov. 26 (Special)—If the crusaders were satisfied with half-way reforms they might with profit turn their attention to the matter of educating Germany on the evening-dress problem. This continues to be a baffling and insoluble mystery.
