PROHIBITION

(Montreal Gazette) Statements issued at Ottawa are apparently intended to show that if the people would have a dry Canada they must persuade the legislatures of the province to act, the law as it now is given a province power to do for the rum demon:

1. By the provincial legislature requesting a vote on the question and by the majority of the electors in the province voting in favour of prohibiting the importation of liquor.

2. By the province enacting legislation prohibiting its own citizens from either purchasing liquor for personal consumption or from having liquor on their premises.

If such a law were passed, it is pointed out, the Doherty Act would automatically apply, prohibiting importation for beverage purposes; or if any province desired to prevent the importation, pending a vote being taken under the first alternative, they might, pending such vote, prohibit any of their citizens from purchasing for beverage purposes or from having liquor on their premises for domestic use.

The situation is simple. It may be difficult, however, to persuade provincial law-makers to act in the matter as the drys desire. In Ontario Sir William Hearst's government received the prohibitionists' cheers when the extreme law of that province was enacted. Then when election day came, and Sir William Hearst sought the approval of the people, the dry cohorts forgot him. He had as reward the consciousness of having done what he considered right. The average politician looks for something more substantial.

THE REASON WHY

ARE THERE TWO SIDES TO THE RAINBOW?

No, there is only one side to the rainbow. The rainbow is made by reflection of the rays of sunlight through drops of water in the air, but you can never see a rainbow unless you are between it and the sun. You could never see a rainbow if you were looking at the sun, and so if you are looking at a rainbow you can be certain that anyone on the other side of it could not see it, because they would have to be looking right at the sun. The rainbow is always opposite to the sun and there can never be two sides to it.

DO THE ENDS OF THE RAINBOW REST ON LAND?

The ends of the rainbow do not rest on anything. You see, the rainbow is only the reflection of the sun's rays thrown back to us by the inside of the back of the raindrops, which are still in the sky after the rain. Of course, if any of the drops of water touched the ground they would cease to be raindrops and, therefore, could not reflect the rays of the sunlight. So, what we think of as the ends of the rainbow do not really exist at all. The rainbow is only a reflection of the rays of sunlight from countless drops of water in the air, which the sun's rays must strike at a certain angle in order to reflect back the light so we can see it. Where the sun's rays do not strike the drops of water, at the right angle no light is reflected, and there is the end of the rainbow.
