MONDAY
SUDDEN DEATH—We deeply regret to report that Mr. Cyrus Morris, the father of Rev. Geo. Morris, of Summerside, died suddenly at nine o'clock Friday morning at his residence, aged 81 years. He leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing widow, two daughters at home, Miss Ethel and Miss Florence in Vancouver, and three sons, Messrs Roy at home, Fred in Regina and Rev. Geo. Morris at Summerside.

THREE SICK MEN—In reply to a telegraphic message for assistance from the three light-house keepers at Bird Rocks, the Canadian Government cruiser Margat, left Charlottetown last week yesterday. Capt. Taylor of the Marine Department here received word that the men, who are ill and are being taken to Charlottetown. The Margat is expected to arrive this morning.

DEATH REGRETTED—The community at West Dover has been saddened by the death of Miss Mary Jane Gamble, daughter of the late Mr. John Gamble, who was one of the most popular young ladies of the district. She had been in failing health all the summer and despite the best services of the three doctors and every care possible, passed away on Sunday last at the early age of 36 years. There are left to mourn, her mother, one brother, and two sisters, namely, Mr. Chesley and Miss Madeline Gamble, at home and Mrs. Howard Mountain of Bellefleur. The funeral which was largely attended took place to the Baptist Cemetery at West Devon on Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Thomas Christian, preacher, officiating.

Yesterday evening two men confined in Queen's County Jail on shop breaking charge, awaiting Supreme Court trial, escaped and at the time of going to press no trace has been found of them. The escaped prisoners are Willard Robichaud, age 22, and Willard Bisso, age 28. They were awaiting trial for breaking into Mr. Carver's store, Weymouth St. and have been in confinement since last July. The escape was discovered at 9 o'clock, when the prisoners were to be shut up in their cells for the night. Between 6 and 8 o'clock they had access to the upper corridor, facing the Mt. Edward Road, and it was from the corridor window that they escaped. One of the window bars was cut with a hack-saw blade and blankets tied into a rope enabled them to reach the ground. On discovering the escape of the prisoners at 9 o'clock, Jailer Burns notified the Sheriff and Police headquarters. A search is being made for the missing men.

The death took place on Saturday last of Mr. David Purdy Irving at the advanced age of eighty-one years. The late Mr. Irving was a native of Cherry Valley, and was the last surviving member of a family of eight. By his passing one of the most prominent residents of Queen's County, and in deed of the whole Province, has gone. In earlier life before he had attained his majority, he taught school, and carried on some trading business at Vernon. Then he loaded vessels with produce, and accompanied them himself to the greater markets of the larger cities. Finally he married, when still a very young man, and engaged in farming at Vernon where his extensive property now is one of the most beautiful situated, and most productive farms in the whole country. Mr. Irving steadily prospered until he was looked upon as one of the leading agriculturists and stock raisers of the province of Prince Edward Island. Besides these activities he gave considerable attention to fruit growing, and on his magnificent property at Vernon he set out an orchard of fifteen acres of the then best procurable varieties. He also evidenced his culture and refinement by the beautiful appearance of the lawns and grounds which surrounded his residence. For a life time he was a member of the local Board of Health, and also was connected with the Independent Order of Foresters. For many years he was marked for public honors, and in 1900 Mr. Irving was returned as one of the Liberal members to represent the Fourth or Belfast District of Queen's County. On that occasion his colleague was the Honourable George Forbes. In 1904, with Mr. P.L. (now Mr. Jusice) Haszard, he was re-elected. For almost half a century Mr. Irving was identified with church work and was Superintendent of the Presbyterian Sabbath School,

and his greatest enjoyment was in connection with his activities in a Christian endeavour. In education, Mr. Irving was a firm believer and an ardent advocate. This is shown by the fact that his whole family of twelve children, six boys and six girls, all had the advantage of either a college or university course. The death of his beloved wife formerly Miss Anne Tweedy of Vernon River, which occurred five years ago, was a great shock to him. From that time his rugged constitution began to weaken, and for the past two years it was apparent that he was steadily nearing the end. He bore his sufferings, however, like a Christian gentleman and gradually abstained from engaging in any sort of business or work. Two members of his family, namely Miss Sarah and Mrs. Rev. W.M. McLeod, passed away several years ago. The surviving members are James C. M.L.R.; Mrs. (Major) F.B. McRae; Vernon; Thomas T. Irving, Chief Engineer on the Grand Trunk Railway, Detroit, Mich.; George Irving, B.A., New York City; Mrs. E.T. Higgs, Charlottetown; Alexander Irving, in Calgary, Alta.; Gordon Irving, M.A., teacher in Westmount, Quebec; Mrs. J. H. Donald, Montreal; Mrs. Capt. Hammond Johnson, Montreal. They will ever cherish his memory. To the bereaved, we extend our most respectful sympathy. The funeral of the late Mr. Irving takes place Tuesday the 14th, inst. at 1 o'clock p.m.

NEW INSPECTOR APPOINTED—Among the visitors during the week was Mr. G. H. Brown, District Fruit Inspector for the Maritime Provinces. The Department of Agriculture at Ottawa has felt that the time has come when an inspector should be appointed for the Island Province, whose duties would be to inspect all produce, as well as fruit, for shipment. Mr. Brown has installed in office Mr. J. H. Douglas as Fruit Inspector here, with headquarters at Charlottetown. Mr. Douglas was for some years connected with the Canadian Farm Products, and has had exceptional opportunities for qualifying himself for his new position. He will enter upon his duties immediately. Mr. Douglas will now have inspecting jurisdiction over all fruit and vegetable produce in Canada, because his office carries with it no particular section, although no doubt he will be permanently located on the Island. Farmers, horticulturists, and dealers in produce may obtain further information by applying to Mr. Douglas at his office in Charlottetown. The establishment of this office is in conformity with the Root and Vegetable Act, passed in 1922. There are a number of matters in the Act, such as grading, marketing and packing, weighing of barrels, etc. etc., all of which will come under Mr. Douglas' supervision.
