BRINGING UP FATHER

out of fear that some one will gain more prestige than the other, or stalling it more concisely, to be due to the "worship of Vanity."

A fairly safe rule to value individual qualifications for positions of authority, responsibility and leadership in the larger fields of endeavour, is by the degree to which that individual effectively serves the needs of his own community be it large or small.

It would be well to study the words of Jesus as recorded in St. Matthew, chapter 23, verse 11 "He that is greatest among you shall be your servant."

The world is slowly awakening to the realization of the fact that the degree of success attending any endeavour is relative to the quality of service rendered and the motive directing the effort. Many acts do not bear out the expectations of the performer, due to wrong motives, and hence satisfaction is forced to give place to disappointment.

True greatness is measured by the quality of service rendered, by

the example set, by motives that inspire, and not by power, authority or influence that may be possessed in many cases to misdirected ability and possessions. True greatness is found in the attitude we hold toward our fellowman, our appreciation of him and the strength of desire to help.

It is an established fact that persons best suited to positions of authority and leadership are those who do not strive by means of certain acts to attain them, but are reticent, not anxious to command, humble in spirit, not respecters of persons, do not foster egotism and having firm confidence in themselves are not envious of others' success and ability. Some strive to acquire true greatness by ostentatious acts which get no good results because the motive was prompted by a desire to cover some individual weakness or misdoing.

Good citizenship is based on the following qualifications—Foremost among them is Love, that fundamental and all-prevailing quality.

To get the real meaning of Love let us turn to the words of St Paul in his first letter to the Corinthians chapter 13, (Revised Version). I shall not repeat here but advise the careful, thoughtful reading of same and there will be found the wonder working power of Love. Love embraces many virtues. Chief among these is Humility, that rare and noble virtue, evident in those possessing true greatness. Invaluable lessons in Humility may be learned by an earnest student of the life of Jesus Christ. By studying nature which is God's creation we may learn those lessons of Humility, Patience, Confidence, good cheer, tranquil resignation and temperate joy.

Culture is a requisite for good citizenship which is too often overlooked and wrongly estimated. It does not mean superficial varnish of one kind or another, nor should culture be looked upon as a training to put one in the position of advantage over his fellows. By culture, I mean the process by which the

powers and faculties of human beings are liberated, organized, educated and developed. It increases the power of the citizen to promote the best mode of living among his fellow citizens and attaches more importance to the personal character than it does to possessions. It aims first at human development. There is no place for cliques, destructive criticism, or autocratic display when true culture has been acquired.

Let us therefore awaken to duty, to render service directly by good motives and morals, prompted by love, and executed with that ability which good culture provides. "What's brave, what's noble, Let's do it."—Shakespeare.
