OTTAWA, Ont., June 13.—The preliminary report issued by the bureau of statistics shows the storage holdings of eggs on June 1st, 1926 as 9,384,674 dozens compared to 9,584,531 dozens on June 1st, 1925. Retail extras 42 to 45, firsts 38 to 40, seconds 33 to 35. Broilers lower 24 to 32, delivered alive. Montreal dealers paying delivered extras 32 to 35, firsts 29 to 31, seconds 25 to 28. Wholesale sale extras 37 to 39, firsts 35, seconds 31. Retail extras 44 to 46, firsts 38 to 39, seconds 32 to 35. Winnipeg dealers paying country shippers extras 28, firsts 26, seconds 22. Delivered cases returned. Prices to retailers extras 33 to 35, firsts 30 to 31, seconds 26. Retail extras 37 to 39, firsts 33 to 35, seconds 30. Saskatchewan country shippers were selling extras 25, firsts 24, seconds 18, delivered cases returned. Prices to retailers extras 30 to 32, firsts 27 to 28, seconds 22 to 25. Retail extras 35 to 40, firsts 30 to 35, seconds 25 to 30. Edmonton egg receipts are light and the market is firm. Country dealers are making sales extras 25, firsts 21, seconds 17. Prices to retailers extras 36, firsts 22, seconds 20. Calgary dealers paying country shippers extras 25, firsts 21, seconds 16, jobbing extras \$11.00 per case, firsts \$9.00 per case, seconds \$7.50 per case. Vancouver dealers paying country shippers extras 26, firsts 24, pallet extras 22 delivered. Vancouver cases returned. Jobbing extras 30 to 31, firsts 27 to 28, pallet extras 24 to 25. Light broilers continue to arrive in increasing quantities. Broilers of the heavy breeds are coming in small quantities and are being principally shipped to the Yukon alive. St. John, N. B., country dealers paying producers extras 36, firsts 25, seconds 23, making sales extras 29, firsts 27, seconds 25. Prices to retailers extras 34, firsts 31, seconds 28. Halifax, N. S., dealers paying country shippers delivered Halifax extras 36, firsts 32, seconds 25, jobbing extras 40, firsts 36. Charlottetown wholesalers paying country points extras 29, firsts 27, seconds 24, jobbing extras 34 1-2, firsts 31, seconds 26.
