LAYMEN'S RETREATS AT BOUCHERVILLE.

MONTREAL, June 18.—The second season of Retreats for English-speaking laymen opens on Thursday night at the Retreat House at Boucherville. The popularity of these retreats is evidenced by the large number of names already inscribed for one or other of the four retreats at Boucherville to be conducted in English. Over eighty men have already signified their intention of making a retreat this year. These intending retreatants, or exercitants, as they are more accurately styled, are drawn from all classes, but chiefly from the professional and commer-

cial classes, and include the names of several of the best known business and professional men of Montreal. Recently, a largely attended meeting was held of all those who had made the Retreat at Boucherville. After listening to reports on the previous year's Retreat, the Exercitants formed two committees to promote and extend the work during the year 1912. The English committee, which contains several representative names, took up the work with enthusiasm, and as a preliminary step, issued a small pamphlet which sets forth briefly the nature of Laymen's Retreats, and gives some practical directions as to how one makes them.

These retreats are open to men of all classes, and all are equally welcome. Even non-Catholics are not excluded and several of the names on the list are those of men who do not profess the Catholic faith. (Rev. Father Drummond and Hingston of the Society of Jesus who are conducting these retreats at Boucherville, will open a Retreat for laymen at St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, on Thursday night, June 27th.)

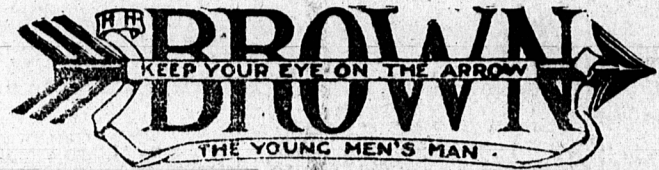
