### McKinnon-Bruce Election Trial.

Further evidence taken in the election trial at Georgetown was given by Messrs. Roderick McLeod, Alder Brehaut, Daniel B. McPherson and Lauchlin McPherson. Roderick McLeod of Glen William testified that he was at Cartney McLure's on the night before election and had one drink, but saw no more liquor. He got none for nothing.

Alder Brehaut, employed in Hon. D. A. McKinnon's office, was examined at length and is a nephew of Mr. Bruce. He went to the district to canvas for Mr. Bruce, making his headquarters at Murray Harbor. He drove round the road to Georgetown and crossed in the steamer from Georgetown during the campaign. He visited the freight sheds there. He testified that he did not take any liquor there, nor get any there, nor did any one get any on his order. He did not know of liquor coming to the station and was not there in disguise. He gave Lauchlin McPherson no liquor or order for liquor. He stayed one night only at Dr. Barnes and brought some liquor there—likely a bottle, but did not treat anybody. Had no liquor at his father's place. Had some liquor at Angus Ross's but did not treat. Carried liquor, which he got at different places. Got none from Charlotte-town or Georgetown, but got some from Montague—never more than one bottle at a time. Attended two meetings. Drove to Peter's road on election morning and called into some places. May have treated some one, but did not remember it. Had liquor in the sleigh. Was outside at the poll, about three hours, but did not treat any one. Left the liquor in the sleigh and it was not there when he got back. Did not remember where he got the liquor, but took it with him from Murray Harbor. Saw a bottle Cartney McLure had at the election. In answer to the Judge witness stated that he did not make use of liquor in the election and did not bring any into the district.

Allan McDonald of Valleyfield East testified that he voted for Bruce at Whim Road Cross, and had no liquor on election day and handled none. He was at Montague Bridge on the night of the election and treated Daniel B. McPherson, Lauchlin McPherson and John McDonald on the way home.

Daniel B. McPherson testified that he voted for Bruce at Whim Road, and swore that he had his land for six months. His vote was objected to. He got the deed about two weeks before election. The deed was sent him from Charlottetown without his request. He got the land from his father, not from Matheson. His father bought the place from Matheson about three years ago. Thought the deed was drawn in D. A. McKinnon's office. It was not signed by witness' father or mother. Allan McDonald gave him a drink on the way home from Montague election night. There was but one bottle in the sleigh. It was between 9 and 11 o'clock when he got the drink. Had voted about one o'clock and had no idea he was going to get a drink when he voted. Did not get a drink from any one else that day.
