Ready To Count Millions' Votes In U. S. Polling

How Popular Vote Was Distributed Four Years Ago And States' Strength In Electoral College.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22—(CP)—Election machinery in the United States is being prepared in expectation of a total vote Nov. 5 as high as or higher than the total of 45,646,817 in the 1936 presidential election, which was an all-time high.

In the 1936 election the Democrats, led by Franklin D. Roosevelt, who was seeking his second term in the White House, scored a smashing victory, carrying 523 votes in the electoral college against eight for the Republicans who were led

by Alf. M. Landon, former governor of Kansas. Landon scored a majority in the popular vote in only two states, Maine and Vermont. Maine has five electoral college votes and Vermont has three.

The Democrats polled 27,476,673 votes in the presidential contest, against 16,979,583 for Landon and 1,490,661 for the other candidates—Union, Socialist, Communist, Prohibition and the like.

In the passing of Miss Jenkins, Mt. Herbert has lost one of its most lovable characters, who, although so young, and in spite of her frequent illnesses, did always strive for the noblest and the best in life, and, who, with the talents given her, did strive to serve One, to her own spiritual good, to the welfare of her family and community, to the honor of her God, of whom she was able to say, "The Lord is My Shepherd."
