DISARMAMENT GESTURE IS IGNORED

France and Germany Only Powers Having Reduced Their Fleets, Says Jellicoe.

PORTSMOUTH, England, Aug. 6.—(C. P. Cable)—Britain's disarmament gesture in reducing her navy by much more than 51 per cent since the war had been ignored and it was time she returned to safety. Earl Jellicoe, former Admiral of the Fleet, declared as he opened Naval Week here.

Speaking from the bulwarks of Nelson's flagship "Victory" Saturday, Earl Jellicoe said every other nation except France and Germany, who had her navy forcibly reduced, had increased their naval strength while Great Britain was reducing hers.

At the three great home ports of Portsmouth, Plymouth and Chatham this week the English taxpayer by the tens of thousands, after paying a modest shilling, will inspect most of the wonders of Britain's floating war engines.

Show the Flag

The British navy is "showing the flag." And besides the inspection of battleships, half a score of additional entertainments have been promoted for the taxpayers declaration. Here, for instance, a realistic fight is to be staged between a pirate junk and a submarine, the former manned by men who have served in seas where piracy is still rife.

Robertson's Condition Unchanged

OTTAWA, Aug. 6.—(C.P.)—The condition of Senator Gledson D. Robertson was declared to be "unchanged" tonight. The former Conservative Minister of Labor suffered a paralytic stroke on Wednesday evening.

Earthquake Shakes City

LIMA, Peru, Aug. 6.—(A.P.)—A strong, long earthquake tremor shook the city at 9:55 p. m. last night. Motion pictures theatres were emptied instantly with apparently no injuries and immediate reports indicated there was no property damage.

MILD WARNINGS HANDED GERMAN FOREIGN OFFICE

PARIS, Aug. 6.—(A.P.)—The French and British Governments have instructed their Ambassadors at Berlin to present to the German Foreign Office identical oral communications pointing out the alleged danger and impropriety of recent Auto-German incidents. This step came as the first exercise of the Four-Power-Peace pact recently signed at Rome. It was understood that the Ambassador of Italy made an informal observation along similar lines to Foreign Minister Von Neurath

Strike Situation In Cuba Nears Open Revolution

President Machado, Will Ask Congress For Full Power At Special Session. Transportation Facilities Completely Tied Up.

(Associated Press)

HAVANA, Aug. 6.—One bystander was killed and three wounded late today in another outbreak of violence in connection with the Cuban strike.

The victims were shot down as they stood at Zanja and Oquendo Streets by three unidentified men armed with a sub machine gun and a sawed-off shotgun who sped past the corner in a coupe.

HAVANA, Aug. 6.—(A.P.)—The Cuban strike spread like wildfire today and the island's situation became a race between mediation and open revolution.

The United Railways Workers struck at midnight, completely tying up the transportation facilities of the country. Havana street car men, bus and taxi drivers quit work last week.

Restaurants, clubs and other eating places in this city were closed today as foodstuffs could not be obtained and widespread hunger was predicted for tomorrow unless some relief is provided.

Faced with the menace of anarchy, President Machado whose regime has been the centre of political unrest, prepared to call an extraordinary session of Congress to get authority to suspend again constitution guarantees and restore martial law.

Ready to Resign

Undergoes Minor Operation

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., Aug. 6.—Mrs. C. T. Ballyarayne, daughter-in-law of Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Montreal, underwent a minor operation at the Chipman Memorial Hospital here today, having been brought here from St. Andrews, N. B., where she and her husband and children had been staying. Her condition was reported later as being satisfactory. The operation was performed by Dr. A. T. Bazim, noted Montreal surgeon, who was brought to Saint John, N. B. by plane, Pilot Hatton, and from Saint John to St. Stephen by automobile.

Swastikas' Group And Jews Parade In Toronto

TORONTO, Aug. 6.—Peacefully Jews and Gentiles mingled today on the eastern beaches of the city, while police patrolled the boardwalk to prevent any demonstrations. Some time ago the formation of a Swastika Club aroused considerable resentment among the Jewish population, but the resentment died down with the announcement of officials of the club that it intended only to keep the beaches clean, regardless of race or creed. Members of the Swastika Club paraded the boardwalk wearing their emblems while a group of Jewish youths also paraded. An imitation "riot" staged by one group brought police hurrying to the scene, but there was no trouble.

FLOODS CAUSE DAMAGE IN MEXICO

Seven Persons Drowned, Thousands Homeless in Flood Stricken Area.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 6.—(A.P.)—Seven persons were reported drowned at Monterrey, Mexico, in floods following a tropical hurricane carrying torrential rains.

Thousands were rendered homeless. More than a quarter of the large city was isolated or under water tonight.

Three hundred homes in one lowland quarter were levelled by the almost unprecedented floods. Residents fled to higher ground.

The large Santa Catarina River, which in 1909 drowned hundreds of citizens, is straining its levels and some of the better class residences were threatened.

The Colonia Independencia suburb was isolated following the washing out of a bridge. Families living there were brought out by boat in scores of thrilling rescues, eight persons were reported in bad condition from exposure.

THREE KILLED IN EXPLOSIONS

Cause of Blast in Intermountain Fireworks Co. Unknown.

IDAHO FALLS, Ida., Aug. 6.—(A.P.)—Three persons were killed and another was burned severely in a series of explosions in the manufacturing plant of the Intermountain Fireworks Company here last night. The cause of the blast was not ascertained.

The dead: Roland Williams, proprietor of the factory; Alfred Blaser, 26, an employee; Lucille Williams, 15, niece of the proprietor.

Thomas Williams, 12, son of the owner was blown clear of the building by the first explosion and was taken to the Latter Day Saints Hospital here, suffering from first degree burns.

Two Persons Are Burned Seriously

TORBAY, N. S., Aug. 6.—Two persons were burned, one seriously, as fire destroyed their home here early today and forced them to flee for safety in night attire.

Miss Emmeline Gammon, 55, was removed to hospital in serious condition, and Havelock M. Webber, a near relative, was painfully burned by flames which swept the house when a can of gasoline exploded.

The explosion occurred while Miss Gammon was lighting the kitchen fire. Drenched with burning gasoline, she ran outdoors, calling on Webber, who ran downstairs to her assistance.

On Flight To New York

LONDON, Aug. 6.—(A.P.)—Kohn Grierson young British aviator who began yesterday a flight by easy stages to New York, left the Orkney Islands, north of Scotland, today for Iceland by way of Faroe Islands.

Grierson who had a distinguished flying record as a member of the Royal Air Corps, started from Brough Aerodrome, and spent the night at Scapa Flow before going on to the Orkneys.

Five Men Shot To Death

LOUISVILLE, KY., Aug. 6.—(A.P.)—Five men were shot to death and eight wounded one critically, in fights attributed to Saturday's primary election in Kentucky, and another was killed in what was believed to be an aftermath of a battle during the last November election.

Rossi And Codos Reported Near Vienna, Austria

French Aces Successful Complete Rough Ocean Hop On Attempt To Break Long Distance Flight Record

(Associated Press)

PARIS, Aug. 7.—(Monday)—A gasoline leak early today threatened the attempt of Maurice Rossi and Paul Codos to set a new distance record in their plane, the Joseph Lebrun, but they pushed on toward India after conquering rough weather on their New York-to-Paris flight.

Wireless advices to Le Bourget flying field, over which they passed at 2:20 p.m., E.S.T., said they continued to navigate under a clear sky in lower Austria.

They gave their position at 1:52 a.m. (7:52 p.m., E.S.T. Sunday) as about 20 miles west-southwest of Vienna. They declared they hoped to break the record despite the leak.

The French ace dipped over the airport at 2:30 p.m., E.S.T., nine minutes behind Charles A. Lindbergh's time of 33 hours, 30 minutes from New York to Paris.

From their broad-winged silver monoplane, the Joseph Le Brix, they dropped messages to their wives, who waved frantically to the aviators, and then pointed their ship eastward toward Munich.

Rossi and Codos had covered more than 3,500 miles since they made a perfect take-off from Floyd Bennett Field, New York, at 4:41 a.m. yesterday.

Their heavy plane battled rough weather during most of the flight over the North Atlantic great circle route, wireless messages said.

"Crossing bad from Halifax," read one message sent at 5:10 a.m. while the fliers were about 375 miles from Brittany.

As the plane neared Le Bourget, the aviators sent word that more than one-third of their enormous gas supply of 1,770 gallons remained, and that they hoped to go 3,100 miles further, to better the record of 5,340 miles for a non-stop flight.

The Joseph Le Brix, appearing drab white against the red flush of the setting sun, was sighted at exactly the minute the aviators had predicted in a wireless message an hour earlier.

Prize Fighter Is Shot

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—(A.P.)—Ace Hudkins, prize fighter known as the "Nebraska Wildcat," was shot twice in the chest at a night club altercation early today.

R. H. Harris, 38, proprietor of the club, was booked by police on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon. Hudkins was removed to a hospital in Glendale, where his wounds were described as not serious.

Two Killed As Train Crashes Into Car

TORONTO, Aug. 6.—A youth and girl were instantly killed when their car was struck by a fast Canadian National Railway train here last night at the Victoria Park crossing. The dead: Roy E. Judges, 19, and Evelyn Chalmers, 19, both of East York, were hurled 200 feet. The car was completely wrecked by the impact. An inquest has been ordered.

FIRE DESTROYS OLD LANDMARK IN PRINCE CO.

Farmhouse of Mr. George Read, Read's Corner, Burned to Ground.

Fire on Saturday destroyed one of the oldest landmarks in Prince County. This was the farmhouse of Mr. George Read, at Read's Corner, which was built by Ephraim Read about ninety years ago and had been the home of the Read family for three generations.

The fire started round the kitchen flue. The family were at dinner at the time and passers-by first noticed the fire, and notified Mr. Read. By that time the roof was well alight. There was a north-east wind blowing and the flames quickly spread to the main part of the house, which faces south. When it was seen that nothing could save the house, efforts were concentrated on the removing of the furniture, with the result that the greater part of it was saved. The machinery was removed from the outbuildings for safety, but these buildings did not catch fire. Neighbours from some distance round assisted Mr. Read.
