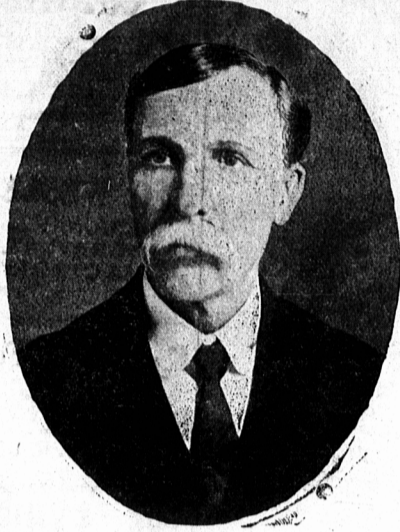

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ADDRESS TO THE PRINCE

The city will make a Presentation to Prince Louis of Battenburg. A Reception.

In answer to a telegram forwarded to Sydney by His Worship Mayor Kelly on Wednesday to Prince Louis of Battenburg asking if he would receive an address and hold a reception in the City Hall here the following reply came last night: Fredk. F. Kelly, Mayor.

Your telegram of September 14 received. I will receive address at City Hall at eleven o'clock on the 18th and attend reception afterwards with pleasure.

Louis Battenburg. It is the intention of the Mayor and Council to meet the Prince at the wharf and escort him to the City Building about a quarter to eleven in the forenoon.

The address will be presented at eleven o'clock and afterwards all citizens who wish to be presented to the Prince will be accorded that privilege.

Councillors Stewart, Hooper and Reddin are the committee in charge and with His Worship the Mayor who has taken the initiative in this matter, are leaving nothing undone to make the affair a creditable one to Charlottetown.

ARRAIGNED FOR MURDER

Edward Cole of New Brunswick Pleads Not Guilty --Date of Trial.

PORTLAND, Sept. 14. -- (Special).--Edward Cole of Hillsboro, New Brunswick, when arraigned here today on charge of murdering John Steeves also of Hillsboro in Falmouth near Portland about April 12th pleaded "Not Guilty."

Cole takes matters coolly and appears indifferent to the result of his trial. The date for the trial has not been set.

HE STEALS A LOCOMOTIVE

While Drunk and is Derailed at Switch--Sent Up for Trial.

PETERBORO, Sept. 14. -- (Special).--Leander Babcock got drunk last night and jumped on board the Canadian Pacific yard engine and opened the throttle.

He had a ride until an open switch derailed the engine.

He was arrested and in court today was charged with having stolen and carried away one locomotive engine.

He was unable to remember the affair and was sent up for trial to the Supreme Court.

OVERFLOW LOCAL NEWS

A rifle shooting match was held at Pictou yesterday afternoon between a team of five from the institution and five city militiamen. After a close contest the former won by one point.

Rev. Edwin Smith, Cardigan, was a passenger last night from Truro where he was attending the marriage of his brother. Mr. Smith also purchased a valuable driving horse while in Nova Scotia.

The warships Cornwall and Berwick have been compelled to anchor three miles outside of Pictou light owing to the shallow water in Pictou harbor. During the last two days a large number of Pictou people have gone out to them but the stormy weather prevented many going on board.

Prisoners leaving for Toronto Alex. McKinnon who has been captain of the Boys Highland Brigade for some time, was presented by them with a set of ebony Military brushes, silver mounted, accompanied by the following address:-- Dear Sir:--We the members of the Boys Highland Brigade, on this the occasion of your departure from Charlottetown, desire to express our appreciation of the faithful manner in which you have discharged the duties of captain of our Brigade. We also desire you to accept the accompanying as a small token of our esteem and all heartily join your many friends in wishing you every success in your new sphere of life. On behalf of Brigade, David Bethune, Lieut. A large number of the boys were also at the station to bid farewell to Mr. McKinnon.

ANGLICAN SYNOD'S SESSIONS ENDED

Many of Those Attending Left for Home Yesterday--Report of the Committee on Temperance Creates Some Discussion and is Referred Back--Ottawa for Next Meeting

QUEBEC, Sept. 14. -- (Special).--The Anglican Synod will prorogue at noon tomorrow.

The principal business was finished today and many of the delegates left for home.

Several motions which had been announced were withdrawn.

Today the report on temperance was considered and some speakers opposed the condemnation by the committee of the Götterburg system believing it had not been properly represented before a committee.

The Synod favored all practical means to prevent the spread of the liquor traffic but the report was referred back for further consideration.

The Synod decided to accept the invitation from Ottawa to meet there in three years time.

A motion that a special missionary be appointed to work among newly arrived immigrants was referred to a committee for consideration.

SUPPLIES FOR HUDSON'S BAY

Forwarded Under Rush Orders to Save a Colony from Starvation.

St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 14. -- (Special).--The steamer Neptune sailed from here today under rush orders from Ottawa with winter supplies for the Hudson's Bay Company on board.

The Neptune has been lying here loaded for over a month but there was a controversy in Ottawa as to whether the mounted or the marine police should control her.

The orders today followed the urgent telegraphic enquiries of yesterday from the Hudson's Bay colony which feared starvation.

A PLAINTIFF ASKS DAMAGE

QUEBEC, Sept. 14. -- (Special).--Andrea Villast of Villanville, township of L'An-nuniation has entered action against the Northern Trust Co. and Canadian Pacific Railway from three hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars.

He claims that a spark from a Canadian Pacific locomotive started a fire which destroyed Villanville including the plaintiff's extensive sawmills by reason of which he was prevented from completing contracts and consequently became insolvent.

DIED SAME WAY AS HIS VICTIM

Minot, N. D., Sept. 13.--The dead body of Charles Herzig, who left a written confession that he was guilty of a murder committed near Youngstown (Ohio), more than thirty years ago has been found by a posse of searches. The body was hanging to a tree in a secluded ravine in the county of Wallace. Pinned to his breast was a piece of wrapping paper on which was written the following:-- "My name is Charles Herzig. Over thirty years ago I murdered a young girl named Lizzie E. Grombacher, near Youngstown (Ohio). Charles Sterling an innocent man, was tried convicted and hanged for the murder of this girl. If my body is ever found, notify my mother Catherine Herzig, at Girard (Ohio)."

If Herzig had not left a written confession and had not made at the ranch a threat of suicide, his body might not have been found for years as he hanged himself in a spot seldom visited.

Around his neck was a shred of green stuff such as is used as a face veil. It is recalled by a former Youngstown man that Lizzie Grombacher wore such a veil when murdered and that part of it was used to strangle her. The piece found about Herzig's neck is supposed to be the remainder of the veil as he showed such a piece to a fellow ranchman, to whom he told the story of his crime, declaring that he had kept it all these years to use in ending his own life some day.

Herzig said in his confession to the ranchman that after committing the murder and exchanging shirts with Sterling, he went to Warren (Ohio), where he was employed as a gardener by a lawyer named Ratliff. After Sterling's arrest and trial Herzig fled to Mesopotamia (Ohio), where he remained in hiding until the eve of Sterling's execution when he stole a horse and went west. He settled in Telluride (Colo.), where he married. Ohio people commenced to move in, and becoming frightened he deserted his wife and child and went to California. Since then he has been a wanderer.

BOTTLE AFLOAT FOR FIVE YEARS

Brings to Land a Message of Shipwreck on Scotland's Coast.

MONTREAL, Sept. 14 -- (Special).--On March 1st 1890, the Dominion liner Labrador was wrecked on the coast of Scotland but all hands were saved.

When the ship struck, George Brandford, a cattle man, wrote a note recording the fact and placed it in a bottle which he threw overboard.

The letter was addressed to the Montreal Star and turned up today. It was picked up in Hermitage Bay, Newfoundland, on August 17th.

In five years the bottle had drifted across the Atlantic the distance being sixteen hundred miles in a straight line.
