SALMON STRIPPING.—"Stripping" operations will begin at Maritime fish hatcheries about October 20, when eggs will be extracted from the mature fish for cultivation purposes. It was announced yesterday by James Catt, inspector of fish hatcheries for the Maritime Provinces. At present there are 14 active hatchery departments, of which seven are in New Brunswick, one in Prince Edward Island, two in Cape Breton and four on the Nova Scotia mainland. Atlantic salmon eggs will be taken in this province from fish in the Saint John pond at Red Head, the Miramichi pond, New Mills pond and the Matapedia River, the last source by courtesy of the controllers of fishing rights on the Matapedia. Eggs will be secured also at the Morrill River, Prince Edward Island, while the Nova Scotia hatcheries will be supplied by the Margaree River, River Phillip and Adams Lake. About six streams are available in Prince Edward Island and the northern section of Cape Breton for eggs of the wild, speckled trout. Land-locked salmon eggs will be taken at Chameook Lake, N. B. It is expected that there will be a good supply of eggs of brown Loch Leven and speckled trout procurable for domestic stock.—St. John Telegraph Journal.

DECLARES WAR

(Special to the Guardian)
SHANGHAI, Oct. 12.—Resolved to suppress flings of rebellion, the Nationalist Government today virtually declared war against Gen. Feng Yu-Hsiang, one of the Chinese lords, who has been a thorn in the side of the present regime for several months. The state council of which Chiang-Kai-Shek is president issued a mandate ordering a punitive expedition against two of Feng's generals, Ung Chi-Yuon and Shin-Ting-Ming, both these generals, advancing now on Hankow, along the Peiping-Hankow railway, were declared to have reached Hsu-Chang, near the centre of the Honan province.

LONDON Oct. 12.—Following a declaration of war against the rebel and "christian" war lord, Feng-Yu-Hsiang, the state council of the nationalist Govt. ordered the arrest of War Minister Lu Ching-Lin, said a despatch to the detailed express today. The War Minister, the despatch added, was charged with plotting against the government and the order for his arrest was issued by Chiang-Kai-Shek, president of the council.

At Rotary

"The Building of Manhood" was the subject of an address delivered at the Rotary Luncheon yesterday by Rev. F. M. Milligan, Maritime Secretary of the Board of Religious Education of the United Church of Canada. Mr. Milligan said that there has been a great deal of criticism heard today of modern youth, but it must be remembered that conditions have greatly changed during the past few years and the boys are facing many new elements—new opportunities for pleasure. The whole social fabric is changing and materialism is abroad in the land. He declared that character and the whole personality develops not by precept but by living in real situations. There is too much of the abstract in the teaching of today. Youth must be brought in contact with real situations and allowed to exercise free choice but that liberty must be used for some constructive and noble purpose in order that the boys may be helped to grow. To help boys to grow by living is the whole tendency in educational work today. The man must go into the situation with the boy and help him to make right decisions. Today the father is usually so occupied with his business and the mother with her household and social duties that they do not find time to give that attention to their children that they should. The happy family familiarity of the past is gone. Youth is left to dream its own dreams without the restraining hand and guidance of age and experience. He then referred to the education which the boys received on the playground and stressed the need of organized play in the life of boys in order that honesty, self reliance and other qualities may be developed.

Mr. Frank M. Stewart was in the chair, and there was one guest, Mr. John McCoy of New York City. The musical program included a vocal solo by Mrs. E. W. MacKinnon who was encouraged.
