A Copy of the London Daily Mail forwarded to THE GUARDIAN by Mrs. Rogers contains the following: The system of having a separate communion cup for each member of the congregation was yesterday put into practice. The place where the experiment was tried was Tacket-street Congregational Church, Ipswich, and it was an outcome of revelations made at last year's Sanitary Congress at Aberdeen by Dr. Browning. The doctor traced the spread of disease to the presence of bacteria in the chalice and urged the desirability of adopting the more sanitary American method of having a separate vessel for each person. The solemn experiment at Tacket-street Church yesterday when 150 persons partook of communion was favourably regarded by the congregation. The communicants sat in alternate pews and the deacons bore to them the separate small communion cups arranged on fitting wooden trays, each tray carrying forty tiny glass vessels. The minister had previously read the offertory prayer. In America it is usually the custom for the congregation to take the communion in this way simultaneously, and it is held that the ceremony gathers, rather than loses, in solemnity by this circumstance, while the risk of disease being spread is greatly reduced.

LAST night several members of the Normal Bible classes of the city met at the home of Rev. G. P. Raymond and were treated to a test examination on the contents of the first part of their text book, Dr. Hurlbut's revised Normal Lessons. 9—Give the names of the builders of the three Temples and dates when they were built. Also name and classify the seven feasts.

10—Write a note on the Synagogue, speaking of its history, its influence on the Jews and on the spread of Christianity.

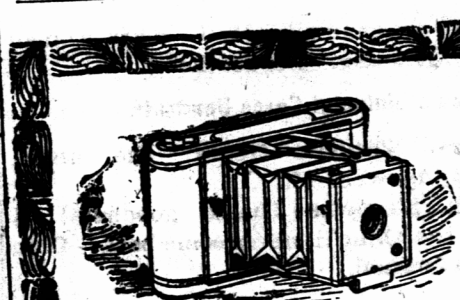
