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THE WEEK'S WINNERS

HARTFORD, Conn., Aug. 8.—The unexpected victories of Tarzan Grattan and Todd Hart in the big purses at Kalamazoo were the outstanding features in light harness racing last week.

Tarzan Grattan, the new star in the harness world, is a five-year-old gelding by Grattan Royal. He was bred in Ontario and began racing in 1924.

In 1924 Tarzan Grattan won three out of eight races. He closed the season with a record of 2:13 1/4 which he made at Toronto in November.

Last May George Walsh shipped him with three other Grattan Royal pacers to Cleveland. Two of them started at the first Grand Circuit meeting.

Tarzan made his first big race at Toledo, Ohio, in 1924. He won a heat in 2:09 1/2, but lost the race to Frank Worthy in 2:03 1/2.

This showing, together with the fact that Tarzan Grattan worked a mile in 2:02 1/2, prompted Walter T. Candler to add him to the Lullwater Farm racing stable.

Nat Ray was given the mount at Kalamazoo at which Thomas was driving the winter favorite Lulla Forbes. Tarzan won in 2:03 1/2.

The showing made by Tarzan Grattan, Norman Grattan, with which Pally also won at Kalamazoo, and several others of the same family recalls the shadows and sunshine which followed in the wake of their sire, Grattan Royal.

Fifty years ago cheese making was truly only in its infancy in Prince Edward Island and as it was considered necessary to leave the care of the infant to the women the toil of cheesemaking fell largely upon the fair sex.

At that time beyond the help of a big wooden press the process of making was carried on by hand and is remembered quite well by the older folks of today.

In fairness to the makers, we must state that they manufactured an excellent article and when exhibition time came were fully alive to the task of placing their product in competition and seeing that they received a just award.

Truly the output was very limited, and the process was very toilsome, so much so indeed that the husky men and boys of today should not be heard complaining about hard work and early rising.

We have before us a mutilated copy of a paper whose name has been torn off which contains a description of the hand-making process then carried on which we copy for the information of present day patrons, makers and consumers.

It goes on to say what they received had to do in those bygone days. The quotation referred in the following quotation was written from the standpoint of an advocate of introducing a more modern system and also ventured on the role of a prophet as regards what might be expected from an up-to-date plant.

It also describes the existing process thus: "The moment that the wives and daughters of our farmers will fully comprehend the advantages and the ease which cheese factories would secure to them they will cheerfully and enthusiastically aid us in having such institutions inaugurated and established in our midst.
