THE COOK'S CORNER

RICH PLUM PUDDING

- 2 1-2 cups currants
3 1-3 cups suet, finely shredded
3-4 cup cherries, halved
1 1-4 cups mixed peel, chopped
5 cups seeded raisins, cut in half
2-3 cup almonds, blanched and shredded
3-4 cup figs, chopped
1 3-4 cups brown sugar
1 cup fruit juices
1 large carrot or 2 small ones
1-2 teaspoon salt
1 tsp baking soda
1 1-4 teaspoon baking powder
8 eggs
2-3 cups fine breadcrumbs
2 lemon juice and grated rind
1 1-3 cups sifted flour
1-2 teaspoon each of cinnamon nutmeg, allspice and cloves

Beat the eggs and add the sugar, cream well and then add the breadcrumbs. Sift the flour and measure and then sift with the soda, salt, baking powder and spices and then add them to the suet and the prepared fruits which have been mixed together. Mix well and add to the first mixture.

Cooked Mince-meat (Without Meat)

- 1 lb. seedless raisins
1 lb. suet
1 lb. apples
3-4 lb. mixed peel
1-4 lb. blanched almonds
1 lb. currants
1 lb. light brown sugar
2 cups apple cider
1-2 teaspoon mace
1-2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 wineglass fruit juice or other liquid

Boil the cider until it is reduced to one-half. Chop the raisins, suet, apples, peel and almonds. Add to the cider the raisins, suet, apples, citron, currants and sugar, and cook slowly for one hour. Then add the almonds, spices, and fruit.
