Annual Meeting Of The Catholic Women's League

The annual meeting of the Catholic Women's League, Charlottetown sub-division was held in the parlors of the Sacred Heart Home, Monday evening, April 8th with a large attendance of members present. After the opening prayer the President, Mrs. MacIntyre read a brief address giving a clear and concise summary of the year's work, commending the various officers and convenors of committees for their splendid co-operation and faithful service for the League throughout the past year. Reference was made to the visit last June of His Grace Archbishop O'Leary of Edmonton the Honorary National Chaplain who so ably addressed the ladies of St. Dunstan's parish on the work of the C. W. L. throughout Canada and its wonderful growth and record of achievement since its inception nine years ago. The sub-division is looking forward to having a future visit from His Grace when he will be a guest in our Diocese at the Solemn Consecration of St. Dunstan's Cathedral. The president spoke of the splendid new hall which is now being prepared and renovated for the use of the League and its activities and stated it was hoped to install a parish library with a goodly assortment of books and reading matter in one of the rooms which will be fitted up for that purpose. The National C. W. L. had sustained a sad loss in the death of one of its past officers, Miss Belle Guerin, the first National President, and Mrs. Walter Armstrong the first Honorary Secretary, both of whom had given zealous service to the organization. Mrs. MacIntyre thanked the members and officers for their loyalty and devotion to the League during her term of office and asked a continued interest, and co-operation with the new board of government.

The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. R. J. Macdonald gave a clear and itemized record of her work in this department and wished to express her thanks to those who so courteously assisted her at various times. Mrs. Macdonald completed her two year term in this capacity and vacated the office as required by constitution.

The financial report as given by Mrs. Casey, treasurer, was a splendid one and surprised even the members by the volume of work done. The sum of \$1375.94 was raised by the sub-division during the past year and \$1323.24 disbursed leaving a credit balance of \$52.70. The Catholic Women's League having been appointed as an auxiliary to the Sacred Heart Home last July the sum of \$634.00 was given to install a modern laundry equipment. Upwards of \$440.00 was expended for fuel, lighting and upkeep of Rosary Hall and about \$250.00 in Social and charitable work. The National obligations were attended to and upon the adoption of the treasurer's report all expressed satisfaction and commendation of the detailed and careful manner in which this report was presented.

The report of the Convenor of the Committee for the "aged and infirm" Mrs. Jas. Kiggins was then read. It showed many charitable acts performed. An aged couple were supplied with groceries and fuel throughout the year and Christmas hampers were taken to the infirm as well as receding ter and religious articles of devotion required by inmates. A Christmas box was also sent to Sacred Heart Home with greetings to some of the inmates who were far from their friends.

The Educational Committee under the Convenorship of Mrs. Frank Murray reported having furnished prizes to St. Dunstan's University, Queen Square and Rochford Square Schools and Notre Dame Convent and also the sending of a subscription toward the National Scholarship. She announced the opening of a second scholarship this year the subject of the essay being, "Immigration; the phase which pleases me most." This Scholarship is a bursary of \$2000.00 and for girls qualified to enter on a university course. There are at present several girls in this Diocese entering the contest, which is National and are busily working on their essays.

The report on social service was given by Mrs. F. J. Casey who has been indefatigable in this work among the poor and helpless, having been for several years Convenor of the Social Service Committee. Families were helped with food, fuel and clothing and the Christmas tree held in Rosary Hall was well patronized, about 220 children receiving a bag of candy, an orange and apple, a toy or game and a useful article of clothing. She acknowledged with thanks, kindly and generous donations from the Knights of Columbus.

R. T. Holman, Ltd., Mrs. W. O. Davy and the members of the League who made it possible to provide much happiness to the poor children of the city at the Yuletide season.

The entertainment committee told of the splendid success, both artistically and financially, of the dramatic performance "Smiling Through" which was presented in Prince Edward Theatre during the week of the Medical Convention last June. A splendid address outlining the work that should be carried on by the C. W. L. was given in Rosary Hall in October by Rt. Rev. Maurice Macdonald and in November Professor Henry Blanchard gave a most interesting and graphic description of his visit to France and other European countries last summer. Musical programs were a pleasing feature of the meetings and social gatherings with refreshments and card parties pleasant interludes in the year's work. The new Willis piano purchased last fall was proving a real benefit and pleasure not only to our sub-division meetings but to those of the Junior League and the St. Zita Club as well.

The president spoke briefly in congratulation of the work done and called upon Rt. Rev. Monsignor Macdonald, the Chaplain, to address the meeting. The Reverend Monsignor commended the work done and the methodical way in which the various reports were presented. There was much work to be done in the parish, a new school to be built and he urged a close co-operation all parish activities. Referring to the new rooms on Richmond St., he assured the ladies they were being placed in first class condition and would be found to be comfortable and commodious and suitable in every way for the work of the League.

It was his desire to provide an excellent library for the use of the parishoners and thought it could be splendidly accommodated in one of these rooms which is in such a central location and easily accessible. He was glad to see so many of the members present and glad to welcome the new comers.

Upon the president vacating the chair, Rev. Monsignor Macdonald presided over the Election of Officers, Miss Florence Dorsey, Convenor of the nominating committee brought in a slate of nominee for the various offices and this was supplemented by nominations from the floor. L. is henceforth to assist this institution in reducing the Building Fund debt, it was the happy privilege of the ladies becoming more intimately acquainted with the good Sisters with whom they will work in conjunction henceforth.

Tentative plans were made for a formal opening of the new Rosary Hall when completed, which will receive due publicity in the press.
