—FARMERS MEETING—A very
interesting meeting was held in the
Augustine Cove Schoolhouse on the
evening of the 4th inst. Mr. Job In-
man, President of the Lots 27 and 28
Institute was chairman and called
the meeting to order at 8 o'clock. He
introduced Prof. Murphy of the Ex-
perimental Farm, Charlottetown, who
gave a very clear and comprehensive
address on the late potato blight, ex-
plaining its growth and the way it
affects the potatoes. He also claimed
that spraying with Bordeaux Mixture
was a sure cure for this disease and
showed by the use of charts, the re-
sults obtained at the Experimental
Farm, where they had 116 bush. more
per acre of marketable potatoes as a
result of spraying. The Professor
held the undivided attention of those
present for over an hour and answer-
ed a large number of questions re his
experiments with the growing of po-
tatoes and the control of diseases
affecting them. He advised the use of
a spray outfit that covered four rows
with two nozzles for each row and
recommended three or four standard
machines from which the farmers
could choose. As a result two mach-
ines were ordered and it is probable
that at least two more will be added
to the number. A hearty vote of
thanks moved by Inspector Boulter
seconded by Mr. A. J. Robinson
was tendered. Prof. Murphy and
suitably acknowledged by him in a
short speech in which he said he was
well pleased with the number present
and the interest manifested. The
meeting then closed.
