—LEFT FOR WOLFVILLE—Mr. R. G. Callander, for some time popular accountant at the Royal Bank of Canada, Summerside, left on Wednesday morning for Wolfville, N. S., where he will take over the duties as accountant at the Bank's branch there. Before leaving Mr. Callander was presented with a gold bracelet for his watch by the staff, who wished him every success. He will be much missed in social circles as he was a general favourite. —OYSTER EXPERIMENTAL STATION TO BE ESTABLISHED AT EAST BIDEFORD—Mr. H. B. Sherwood, a leading Old Country oyster expert, who is a member of the staff of the Fisheries Experimental Station at Castle Bank, Conway, Wales, arrived in Summerside on Wednesday evening. He was accompanied by Mr. A. W. H. Needler of the Dominion Biological Board, who did excellent work last year to resuscitate several P. E. Island oyster areas. Mr. Sherwood has been loaned to the Biological Board at Ottawa for the summer months by the Fisheries Department of the British Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries. He will, in company with Mr. Needler, carry on experiments and research work in every branch of oyster culture, for

which purpose an oyster experimental station will be established at Bideford by the Dominion Fisheries Branch. The Province is to be congratulated on procuring the services of this expert to look into the oyster situation, as Mr. Sherwood has an established reputation in Great Britain as an expert in regard to oysters and mussels. S.

—FINED \$2 AND COSTS—In the Police Court at Summerside on Tuesday morning, one drunk appeared before Stipendiary Wyatt and was fined \$2 and costs or five days.—S.

—SLIGHT BLAZE—An alarm of fire was sounded about 1.45 p. m. for a slight blaze at the residence of Mr. J. M. Noonan's residence, Summerside. A few sparks from the flue had set fire to the roof of the house. It was fortunate that no material damage was done, owing to the quick response of the firemen to the call, who quickly put out the blaze.—S.

—APPOINTED AS SPECIAL POLICEMAN—Mr. Joseph Linkletter, who recently resigned from the Summerside Police Force, was appointed on Tuesday morning as a special policeman, until the arrival of Mr. Lorne Paynter, of New London, who was appointed to the force at the Council meeting on Monday night.—S

—EMERALD DRAMATIC CLUB—The "Double Mystery" drama, which was staged by the Emerald Dramatic Club in Emerald Hall, on Monday March 17th, was a decided success, as evinced by the large number of spectators and the great enthusiasm which they displayed. The plot was quite deep and interesting, while the comedy was well portrayed by the characters, who aptly played their parts and to whom we extend well deserved praise.—E.

—WILL NOT TAKE POSITION AS JAILOR—Mr. William J. Muttart, of Summerside, who was appointed to the position of jailor of the Prince County Jail on the expiration of Mr. Antoine Arsenault's term of office on April 30th, asked Mr. L. R. Allen, M. L. A., on Tuesday morning to allow him to withdraw from the position. Mr. Muttart stated that on thinking the matter over, he had come to the conclusion that as he was nearing eighty years of age, he felt that he was not physically fit to take over the arduous duties of jailor in the Prince County Jail, especially without an assistant. Mr. Allen accepted his withdrawal but has made no new appointment as yet.—S.

—STUDY GROUP MEETING—The monthly meeting of the Bradalbane Study Group was held in Bradalbane School on Wednesday, March 19th, at 2.30 p. m. Supervisor Murphy was present and gave a very interesting talk on "The Combining of Nature Study in the school work" to assist in the School Fair preparation. A discussion on this topic was then taken up by the teachers present, along with many other matters of school interest. In the absence of the entertainment committee, Mr. Roberts gave an intellectual and amusing test in History. Dr. J. R. Matheson, who was a welcome visitor to the meeting, agreed to give the teachers a "Health Talk" at some future meeting. The meeting then adjourned in the usual form to meet again in May.—E.
