Moreover we give all concerned timely warning that if they persist in this unjust proceeding, there will be "wisdom on the green" down here and some one is bound to get hurt. We look on this end of the road being standardized, starting in the EARLY SPRING and also that the work be COMMENCED SIMULTANEOUSLY west of Summerside and east of Charlottetown to Souris, Georgetown and Murray Harbor. We want no TRANSFER STATION at Royalty Jet or anywhere else. We simply want our rights.
