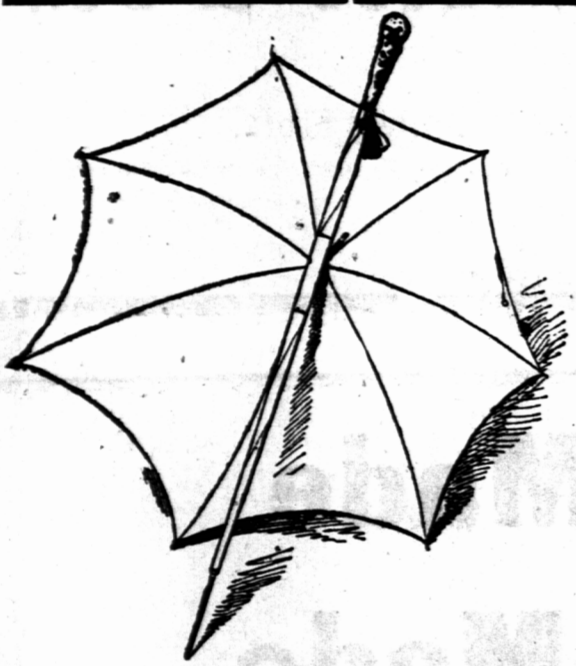

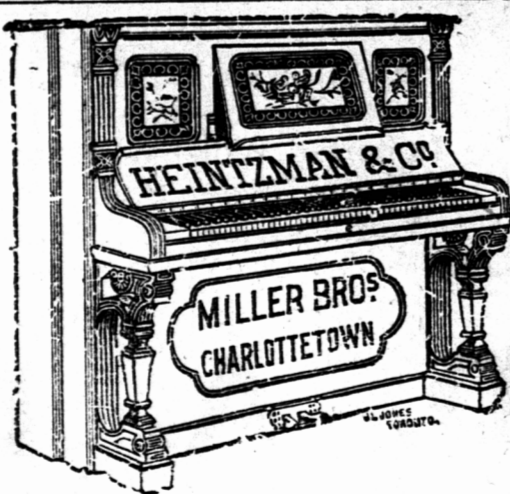

Miss CHARLOTTE T. HOLMAN, formerly of Winsloe, and now of Ajmer, Rajputana, India, in a letter to one of her friends states that she has devoted some time to studying the Hindu language and that the yearly examination comes off in September. She will be required to translate any part of a certain Hindu book and converse in Hindustani with the examiner. Platt's Hindustani grammar, a book the use of Cruden's Concordance, must be digested and assimilated. At the present time the climate is so warm that the houses are shut up at 9 a. m. to keep out the hot air. A man is hired for the purpose of working a tan or "panha" at \$1.30 per month. Not many days ago swarms of locusts obscured the sun for a time as they passed over a certain village. They are a large insect 2 or 3 inches in length, with long wings and legs, and in some places the people eat them and think them very nice. Miss Holman writes: I do hope that there will not be another famine in India. Some said to me last summer that the stories of the late famine were mere exaggerations. But this is not so. It was infinitely worse than represented. No one 11,000 miles away has any idea of the horrors of an Indian famine.

In referring to the marriage of Dr. McCreedy the Sackville Post says: The Methodist church at Point de Bute was the scene of an interesting event Wednesday forenoon. It was the marriage of Miss Agnes Carter, daughter of Albert C. Carter of that place to Dr. C. V. McCreedy of Montague, P. E. Island.
