This munificent gift leaves only \$7,000 now to be raised, in order to complete the needed quarter of a million guineas.

The public schools of Nova Scotia will shortly be equipped with a new series of readers. It is now nearly five years since the agitation first started for new text books. Different educational institutes throughout the Province brought to the attention of the Council of Public Instruction the necessity for some change of the readers then in force. Besides being imperfect in many necessary details, important for the education of the pupils, they were inadequate and obsolete.

The Maritime Contracting and Mining Co., which has been putting in the system water works for the town of Springhill, has brought an action against that town, claiming damages for breach of contract. The Montreal Pipe Foundry Co. has been joined as a defendant. The town in defence claims a right to retain certain moneys due under the contract and also claims the contract has not been duly performed. 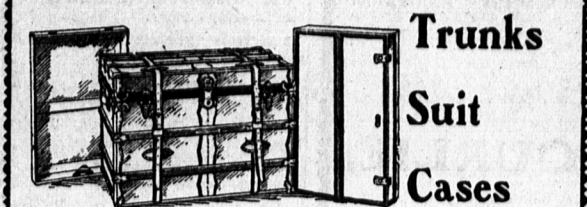

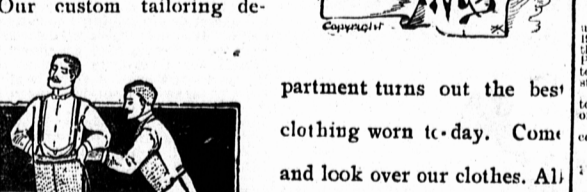
