The Great Race Between Cunarders

The Intense Interest of the English People in the Attempt Now Being Made to Win Back the Atlantic Record.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 10.—Amid the cheering of tens of thousands of enthusiastic people and the shrieking of manifold sirens, the giant Cunard Line turbine steamer Lusitania sailed on a 3,000 mile race against time, across the Atlantic, which all in England are confident will win back for the Cunard Line the laurels wrested from them ten years ago by the North German Lloyd.

Probably never before has so much interest been displayed in the maiden voyage of a new vessel.

The scene was a memorable one. Fully 100,000 spectators lined the lining stage and the river banks, yelling themselves hoarse as the liner gathered headway down the river.

Every river steamer and riverside factory for miles along the Mersey, joined in a deafening chorus of good-byes. Lit up from stem to stern with lights glistening from the port holes, marking her numerous tiers of decks, the mammoth proportions of the Lusitania were emphasized by the illuminations. The demonstration reached its climax when the vast multitude broke out with Rule Britannia. This song was taken up by the crowds on the Cheshire side of the river and sung until the ship with her three thousand passengers had passed slowly beyond the sight of the riverside promenade.

KAISER HAS DAZZLING SHOW

BERLIN, Sept. 10.—Emperor William Tuesday morning reviewed the guard corps in parading Berlin, on the Tempelhof field.

The event was notable owing to the presence of a large number of foreign delegations and the guests of the Emperor. The special military representatives of Great Britain, the United States, Japan, Persia and Abyssinia, formed a prominent group among the members of the brilliantly uniformed staff surrounding the saluting points.

The Emperor displayed remarkable satisfaction at the bearing of the troops before the foreign officers.

After leading the march past his majesty chatted good humoredly with his military guests. Crown Prince Frederick William who led a regiment of cuirassiers, was loudly cheered.

Hundreds of thousands of people lined the streets to witness the emperor's passage from the castle to the Tempelhof field and his return from the review.

LETTER RECEIVED FROM THE KAID

Sir Harry Describes His Sufferings in the Bandit's Custody.

TANGIER, Sept. 10.—Recent letters received from Kaid Sir Harry McLean, the Englishman, who for many years has been in the service of the Sultan of Morocco and who was captured early in July by the Bandit Raisuli, complains that the Kaid is suffering from chills as a result of sleeping on the floor with only a carpet for covering. Raisuli refused to supply him with a mattress, but the Kaid adds pathetically, "The Chief is very kind in sending milk to me as I am afraid to eat anything." Continuing Sir Harry says, he is in a tumble down room, the roof of which on one side is completely lacking. He is guarded by four of Raisuli's men and the five have only one small kettle for water. It is consequently impossible for the Englishmen to wash.

FAST RACING AT CHARTER OAK

After Four Days of Rain Came One With Good Sport.

HARTFORD, CONN., September 11.—Dashing horse races, which time and again brought the ten thousand spectators who went to Charter Oak Park today to their feet characterized the closing and only day's meet of the season at this historic track. Four days of rain caused postponements, until it was decided to give up the purse events and devote one day to the stake contests. For these latter event purses aggregating \$25,000 were hung up. In every race but one favorites were badly beaten, the exception being the Futurity trot, which Douglas won with ease. Sonoma Girl and Tempus Fugit, of whom great things were expected in the star event, the Charter Oak trot, were keen disappointments, while Wilkes Heart won for her owner \$7,000 by taking all three heats, each one of which was a race. Jack Leyburn put up a despatch fight for this prize and only missed it by the inches. His money winners were \$1,800, representing three seconds. In the 2:07 pace the big money getter was Kruger, who by taking two heats got \$2,500, while Douglas, in the Futurity trot, captured \$7,500.

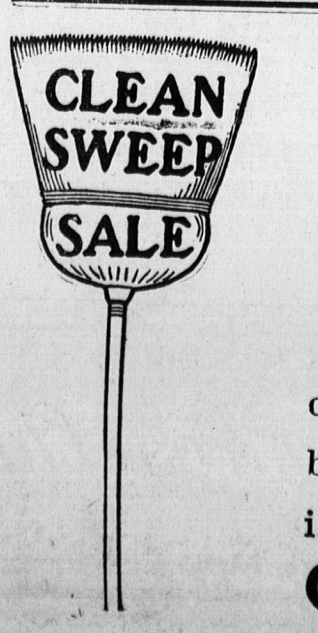
