S.), their Certificates of Discharge. These Certificates should be accompanied by a statement giving particulars of any previous service in South Africa, the rank held, and the name of the former regiment. The address of the owner of the Certificate should also be clearly stated. Men who have not yet received Certificates of Discharge should apply at once to the Officer who commanded the regiment to which they belonged. The Imperial Authorities at Halifax, cannot forward any gratuities to men who do not comply with the above request. Each man of the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th C. M. R., is entitled to a gratuity of £5. Men of the 2nd C. M. R. and 10th Field Hospital are entitled to a War Gratuity.
