**A FORWARD MOVE.**

It is gratifying to note that through the efforts of the Caledonian Club it will no longer be said of Charlottetown that it has no literary institution. The club has arranged for a series of weekly literary evenings in their rooms on Richmond Street. These meetings which will be held every Friday evening will be open to the public and a programme has been prepared which will afford entertainment and instruction to all who care to attend. No charge is being made for admission and a cordial welcome is extended to all.

The first of these meetings will be held this evening. Premier Bell will be the principal speaker. His subject will be "People we Meet." The intention is that at all these meetings the principal speaker will occupy half an hour or so and a short discussion will follow. Among others who have promised to give a lecture or read a paper are Major Bartlett, Rev. Dr. McMillan and Hon. F. J. Nash, each of whom is eminently capable of enlisting the attention of an intelligent audience.

It is hoped that this move will receive the hearty support and co-operation of our citizenship. It is a move in the right direction and will fill a want that has been too long in evidence in our city. We trust the initial meeting tonight will be well attended.

### THE RENA MCLEAN MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

At the meeting of the Rotary Club yesterday the question of retaining the Rena McLean Memorial Hospital for some useful purpose in connection with returned wounded soldiers was discussed and as a result a meeting of those interested has been called for this afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Board of Trade rooms. It is hoped this meeting will be largely attended and that this question, which is of vital importance will be thoroughly discussed.

It is not an uncommon thing to be "wise after the act" and there are those among us who express the opinion that this institution was a blunder at its inception. How illogical and unfair this opinion may be seen when we recall the circumstances which led to its establishment. At a time when the hospitals in England were unable to accommodate the wounded soldiers, when ship load after ship load of wounded men were being sent to Canada the Hospitals Commission appealed for accommodation. Every province responded, including Prince Edward Island. The difficulty here was that we had no suitable hospital to offer and it was only when the late Governor MacDonald acceded to the representations of a number of leading citizens and generously offered to vacate Government House for the purpose that this province was in a position to fall into line with the other provinces in offering to provide accommodation for the wounded heroes. At that time there was no question about finding patients for the hospital. The difficulty was to find accommodation for the patients. The war, as we all know, ended as suddenly as it began and the influx of wounded soldiers ceased as a matter of course. Those already undergoing treatment became convalescent and were discharged or were transferred to other hospitals for special treatment and there are none to take their places. No reasonable person would expect the government to maintain the institution for the few now remaining, but there is no reason why we should not endeavor to have the institute maintained for the benefit of those permanently suffering the consequences of the war. Included among these must be many cases throughout Canada whose recovery is hopeless and who for the remainder of their years must be cared for in homes and institutions for the purpose.

We do not see why Prince Edward Island should not be made the centre for eastern Canada. The site is ideal and the equipment the most modern and complete.

Under the agreement between the Provincial Government and the Hospitals Commission, Government House was to be returned to the provincial government one year after the conclusion of peace. This date has been officially fixed as January 10, 1920, so that there is nearly a year of this tenancy to run and we think no objection would be offered by the provincial government to extend the tenancy for an indefinite period.

**NOT RELIABLE**

A Hamilton police magistrate has acquitted men accused of selling liquor on the ground that the only evidence against them was that of "spotters." In giving his decision he said: "When there is no evidence showing the defendant has been guilty of an offence excepting that of the two men who admit inducing him to break the law, and their evidence is contradicted, it will have no more weight with me than the defendant's." His view of the matter is sound. The evidence of men who induce another man to break the law—should be considered no more reliable than the evidence of the man they accuse. The duty of the branches of the public service charged with enforcing the laws is to see that the laws are obeyed, not to conspire to have them broken. It should be possible to detect lawlessness without tricking men into it.—Ottawa Journal.


The chief business of life is character-making. Characters that are noble do not come by chance. They are built patiently, day by day.
