ESTRANGED WIFE IN FUNERAL PYRE

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Imitating the now almost unknown custom of practicing suttee, by which widows of India up to forty years ago displayed their unending devotion to their husbands, Mrs. Hettie Schneider, thirty-three years old, wife of Peter Schneider, of Springfield, L. I., at noon yesterday selected a secluded part of a wood near her home, built a funeral pyre of wood and dry leaves, saturated her clothing with kerosene oil, lay down on it and allowed herself to be burned to death.

Although her husband is not dead, Mrs. Schneider has been separated from him for a year, and during that time she had made her home with her aged mother, and had frequently expressed the fear that the separation would be permanent. Only twice since the British occupation of India forty years ago has the suttee practice been carried out.

The woman's charred body was found by Henry Meyer, a fireman, and Alexander Hildebrand, a carpenter, Meyer was passing along the Springfield road on his way to the fire house when he heard a shriek. He stopped to listen and again from the depths of the woods he heard a woman's screams, clear and sharp. Meyer hurried to the home of Hildebrand, opposite the woods in Hyde avenue and Springfield road, and armed with revolvers and clubs, the two men plunged into the woods.

After beating about the bushes and trees they saw below them in the heart of the forest a thin curl of smoke. They hurried down the hill and on reaching the spot found upon a pile of smouldering wood and leaves the burned body of a woman.

Although her face and hair were burned away, the men were able to identify the body as that of Mrs. Schneider. Beside the smouldering embers lay a jug in which was still a small quantity of kerosene. The body was removed to the Morgue.

Mr. Schneider was visiting in Brooklyn, when he received word of his wife's suicide.

Up to two weeks ago Mrs. Schneider had lived with her mother, Mrs. W. Higbie, in Far Rockaway. They moved back to Springfield, and Schneider telling her mother that she wanted to be near her husband, Mrs. Schneider, according to her neighbors, was heartbroken over the separation.

Mrs. Schneider comes from a well known Long Island family. At one time the Higbies owned extensive farm lands in Springfield and property in Jamaica. Her father, Walter Higbie, was a prosperous farmer. He died some time ago. Joseph Higbie, her grandfather, was a justice of the peace, and "Squire" Higbie, as he was called, was known in many towns adjacent to Springfield.

Mrs. Higbie was prostrated with grief when she heard of her daughter's death, and her physician refused to allow any one to see her. She had been in ill health and now grave fears are entertained for her recovery. Significant with the method of the woman's suicide was a talk she had with her mother Monday night on the subject of cremation.

"I think, mother," said Mrs. Schneider, "that I would want to be cremated when I die. It seems less horrible than being put down under the cold earth."

Yesterday at noon Mrs. Schneider, who had spent a restless night, told her mother she was going out for a short walk. She put on a jacket, and concealing the jug of kerosene under it, left the house.

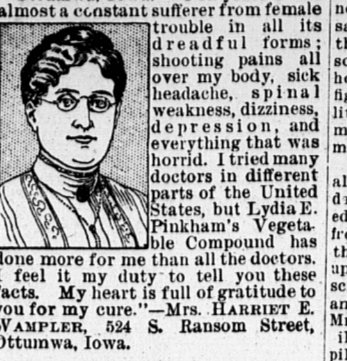

HELPLESS SEES BABY EAT POISON

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Oct. 20.—Sitting helpless in a chair in her home at No. 1,326 South Spangler street, paralyzed hand and foot, Mrs. Charles Griffith today saw her fifteen months old child, Hazel, take a box containing strychnine pills from the table and languidly begin to put them in her mouth.

The mother screamed, but the baby apparently liking the taste of the first pill, took a second. A third followed and the frantic mother, nearly crazed by her helplessness to save the life of her infant, knew that the little girl had taken enough poison to kill her. Death did follow an hour later while a physician was fighting a hopeless fight to save the little life. It is feared her death may also cost the life of the stricken mother.

Mrs. Griffith has been ill from paralysis for some months. Only a few days ago she was sufficiently recovered to be brought back to her home from a hospital. She sat all day in the sitting room of her home propped up in a chair. Her physician had prescribed pills containing a large amount of strychnine to strengthen Mrs. Griffith's heart action. After one day the box in which were the pills were placed on a table.

Then the baby, crawling about the floor, reached upward and pulled herself erect. Her hand clapped the pill box. The top came off and the mother realized the danger. She vainly called to the child not to touch the pills.

Mrs. Griffith screamed wildly for help, but it came too late.
