FOSS TO FIGHT FOR LODGE'S SEAT

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 28.—Information brought to Washington from Massachusetts for the special election of Senator Lodge by a trusted friend who had been in Massachusetts to learn the political situation is that Democratic members of the Legislature of the Bay State will play a very important part in its politics next winter, when a successor is elected to Henry Cabot Lodge as United States Senator.

With a quick realization of this the Democrats have named Thomas Riley as chairman of a committee of one hundred Democrats to see that the right man is nominated in Democratic districts and that anti-Lodge men are supported in districts in which Democrats are weak.

Political affairs appear to be moving in the direction of the nomination of Representative E. N. Foss against Senator Lodge. The campaign made by Representative Foss in the Lovewell district made him the most prominent of the Democrats, and he is represented as carrying little for the house, but longing to displace Mr. Lodge in the Senate.

BANK DEPOSITS TO FARO BANK.

BOSTON, May 28.—How to transfer the deposits of a National bank to a Faro bank without the knowledge of the bank examiner was described yesterday by Coleman, a \$12 a week bookkeeper of the National City Bank at the trial of his friend, and New York companion, Wm. J. Kehler.

"I told Kehler, after I had taken \$185,000 that the jig was up, and that the bank examiner was coming around, but when the official passed my books without comment I continued to take the money and give it to Kehler to bet at Faro," was one of the statements made by Coleman yesterday.

BOSTON, May 26.—The celebration of Independence day in Massachusetts will be along safer lines through the approval of the governor today of a bill materially restricting the use of fireworks and prohibiting blank cartridges. Fire crackers are limited to two inches in length with black gun powder only as the explosive, while no fireworks can contain picric acids or picrates.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section of land. Must reside six months in each of six years, from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.
