Contract Bridge
 Rubber Bridge vs. Duplicate

TORONTO, Nov. 5 — (CP) — Ontario Court of Appeal today quashed the appeal of Mr. and Mrs. George Popowich, convicted murderers of Louis Naro, South Thorold merchant, but at the same time granted a stay of execution until Dec. 5 to enable the appellants to "make further application to Ottawa if they are so advised."

The middle-aged South Thorold couple were to die at Welland one week from tonight, Nov. 12.

It was learned that the Popowich couple would not seek right to appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada, but would ask only for commutation of sentence.

The application for a new trial was based on the contention that evidence given at the trial in Welland last September had been false and they now desired to present new affidavits which would give new facts surrounding the death of Naro.

The 50-year-old Naro was severely beaten on a sidewalk near Thorold last June. He died several days later.

The defence at the trial was an alibi thought up by the two appellants which involved their denial of the charge against them, said Chief Justice R.S. Robertson.

"The jury did not accept their story."

"The appellants now come before the court contending an unworn statement of the deceased man should not have been admitted at the trial. In our opinion the statement was properly admitted..."

The Chief Justice said that it was not by any means certain that a jury would accept the evidence submitted now by the accused.

After North's "reverse bid" of two spades, South was afraid that a three-club bid by himself would sound so weak that North might pass, and South felt that with North holding a strong hand, there might be a good play for game in no-trump. Hence South's two-no-trump call without anything in hearts.

Most players in West's position would automatically open the ten or seven of diamonds, on the sound theory that that was the best chance to defeat the contract. At rubber bridge no fault could be found with this reasoning, but at duplicate the expert would take a different view of the matter. He would not try to beat three no-trump! He would reason that with East unable to overcall even one club, the East-West hands were absolutely matched as too weak to have a fighting chance for five tricks. On that analysis, West would aim his opening lead, not at the defeat of the contract, but against extra tricks and he would realize that a diamond lead might go right up to a tenace on declarer's hand. This he would select the heart ten, and he would be rewarded by declarer's mising one trick less than against the diamond opening.
