(Canadian Press, Aug. 17)—The MONTREAL, Que. Aug. 17—The feature of the export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today was the good enquiry from foreign buyers for spring wheat on the spot, but owing to the very limited offerings little business of importance was transacted. The demand for oats and barley was slow and no sales were reported. Ocean grain from this port for the month of August is now well booked up and rates are fairly steady. The local market

for grain was quiet, the demand being only for odd cars to meet immediate wants. But the probabilities are that there will be considerable more activity as soon as the new crop commences to move. Prices for all grades of oats were reduced from two to three cents per bushel. The volume of business transacted in spring wheat flour was moderate sized and prices were well maintained. The market was firm but the trade was inactive. Considerable trade was done in all lines of mill feed under a good demand from all sources. The tendency was firm. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was fair and prices were quoted two cents lower. The egg market continued quiet and steady. Prices for all grades of butter were advanced 1 to 1 1/4 cents per pound. The cheese market was easier and prices were reduced 3c to 8c to half cent per pound.

OTTAWA, Aug. 17—Continued quiet is still the outstanding aspect of the egg market throughout Canada. Extremely hot weather throughout the east together with the absence of a large number of people from the cities on holidays, keeps the Montreal and Toronto markets quiet. The majority of the Prairie Provinces remain unlight, with the exception of North Battleford where a slight increase is noted. In Edmonton a two cent advance in prices has taken place. For the first time during the present month a change has been noted in the Vancouver market with a stronger tone and slight increase in prices. Toronto market is steady and unchanged. Dealers pay country points extras 35 to 38, second 25 to 28, Montreal egg market is quiet owing to the hot weather and no change in prices has taken place. Dealers are paying country points extras 30, first 28, second 25. Edmonton egg market took a 2 cent advance over the week-end. Dealers quoting country shippers delivered extras 32, first 28, second 25. Winnipeg, the Manitoba market remains unchanged. A carload of eggs is reported at firsts 33 1/2, seconds 29 1/2, f.o.b. Neepawa.

Vancouver fresh egg market is stronger with dealers paying country points extras 39, firsts 37, Halifax reports no change in the egg and poultry market. Dealers are paying country points extras 37, firsts 33 to 35, seconds 25. St. John, N. B.—A fair supply and good demand are the chief features of this market. Wholesale egg prices extras 42, firsts 40, seconds 35.

There were four issues of the Camp Paper the contributions to which brought out the hidden talents of the different campers, along all lines essential to a successful paper.

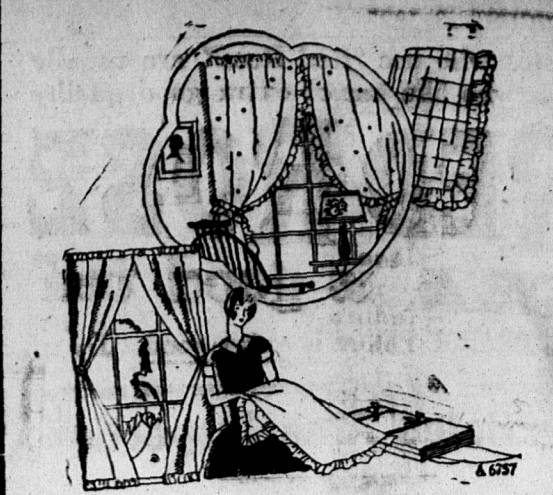

doubled under the present Liberal-Foster-and-Veniot leadership. It was proposed by the latter to incur an expenditure of nine or ten millions more on hydro-electric development at Grand Falls, without an estimate of what the total cost would be, and with no assurance that the product could be sold at a price to cover the cost of production. It was further arranged that the work should be carried on under a Commission of which Premier Veniot should be at the head and paid a good round salary. He had before the election given a solemn pledge that not a dollar would be spent on the work until the people had been consulted and approved the undertaking. In face of this pledge he had gone on and let a contract to begin the work.

The answer of the people was the defeat of six Ministers of the Veniot Cabinet and the election of thirty-seven Opposition members under Hon. Dr. Baxter, who is pledged to cancel the Grand Falls contract. The incident serves to illustrate the old saying that "Whom the gods would destroy they first make mad." Politically and audaciously mad the Veniot government must have been according to the record. Hope returns to New Brunswick when hope had almost gone, but there and in Nova Scotia it returns under an appalling load of debt.

Amalgamation of Canada's two great railway systems as a remedy for our railway troubles is not regarded favorably by the Toronto Globe, which devotes a leading article to the subject. Among other things the Globe says: "Giving up the Nationals to the C. P. R. will neither get rid

They fear the monopoly of a single system under private control and prefer the competition of two systems, one of which is under private control.
