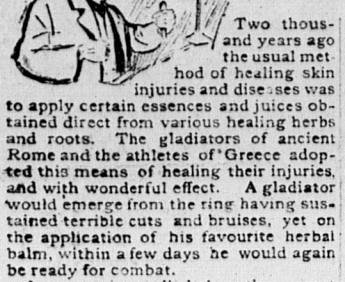

ANNUAL MEETING OF BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Bank of New Brunswick was held Monday, with James Manchester, Thos. McAvity, Dr. W. White, E. P. Starr, G. W. Jones, C. P. Baker, H. Hilyard, J. A. Belyea, W. E. Foster, J. A. Heeds, J. E. White, G. Sidney Smith, T. Barclay Robinson, J. Roy Campbell, B. G. Kaye, A. H. Hanington and the manager, R. B. Kessen, present.

Mr. Manchester presided and Mr. Foster was secretary.

The annual report of the shareholders was read and adopted. It is printed on page 3 of today's issue, and shows the bank in excellent position. The net profits for the year were \$34,440.98, to which is added the sum of \$15,494.82, the balance left over from the previous year. The sum of \$87,762.03 was paid out in dividends, the sum of \$20,000 was added to the rest account, and a new amount to \$1,291,873, and a balance of \$27,176.83 is carried over. The last quarterly dividend was at the rate of 13 per cent., the biggest paid of any Canadian bank. The deposits bearing interest on Dec. 31 amounted to \$3,321,630.59, while the deposits not bearing interest amounted to \$899,099.77.

Mr. Manchester said that in spite of the depression the bank's business everywhere has increased, although the bank had increased its capital it was still short in circulation. The assets have increased in what are called available; caution had been used in order to be prepared to meet the demands of customers. It had been suggested that the bank should have increased its rate of discount, but this had not been considered advisable. The bank now has eighteen branches, and bright, attentive and courteous officials. The outlook is bright, but caution and prudence will be used as in the past.

James Manchester, Dr. White, F. P. Starr, G. West Jones, C. P. Baker and Thomas McAvity were re-elected directors.

A. H. Hanington moved a vote of thanks from shareholders to directors, which was seconded by G. Sidney Smith.

Mr. Kessen said the year had been fairly good, and the bank is now in a strong position, ready to take advantage of circumstances or to enter new fields when it can be done with profit. The branches have all shown profits some of them almost surprising. In Halifax there is an excellent outlook. Loans, Mr. Kessen said, had improved in quality. Although the lumber business last year was not bright or profitable, the lumbermen were cautious and careful. The fishing business was disappointing.

OPPOSE KISSING OF COURT BIBLES

LONDON, Jan. 20. — The ancient controversy on the none too savory subject of the English manner of kissing the oath, an agitation against the practice of kissing the testament in court—nearly always an old-fashioned smelling book, kissed in turn by hundreds of thousands of fool lips—has broken loose in a more aggravated form than ever it did, and during the last few days has reached something like fever heat.

Colonel Maple once cited the case of a well known prima donna who contracted a distressing malady of the throat, which involved heavy expense for treatment, and the loss of her occupation as a direct result of kissing a filthy court Testament.

Doctors, with their usual disinterestedness strongly oppose the prevailing osculatory form of the oath in English courts, and certainly it needs some hardihood to press one's lips to the repulsive looking covers of some of the police court Bibles. To the suggestion that witnesses can open the book and thus avoid saluting the begrimed covers, which are kissed with varying degrees of fervor by a wayward assortment of human beings, it is urged that all books open ost readily at one particular page.

There have been proposals for an act of parliament enforcing the Scottish oath of affirmation or making it requisite to hold the book in one hand only, but the government load-

ed down with so many unfulfilled promises as it is, is not likely to give time to such a measure.

Sir Ureel Barnes, president of the divorce division, started at the sitting of his court yesterday that as so few witnesses avail themselves of the Scottish alternative to the English oath, instructions have been given to the attendants to remind people of the option before they were sworn.

Other justices are now also asking witnesses how they want to be sworn, the magistrates likewise agreeing that the people may swear as they please. Judge Bacon, however, shows a different front. He is very much annoyed at the fuss which people are making all of a sudden. "It is only a fad," he said, "an instance of the disutility of such a fad was shown in his own court."

When Judge Bacon noticed that a doctor, who was called as a witness, kissed his thumb instead of the book, he said—"You can be sworn in Scottish fashion if you wish it. It is evasive and not becoming to a gentleman to kiss his thumb, though it is tolerated in Old Bailey."

The British Medical Journal this week has expressed, perhaps, that another subject should have come up against which they can warn the public, says the movement against the practice, which dates back to medieval times, when a malignant itch of the chin, mouth or throat was believed to be caused by kissing the book, is a just and proper one, and that the only real remedy is the abolition of the practice altogether.

The kissing of the book is akin to the kissing of images. Some of the results of taking the oath in the optional way are very funny. That it is Scotch is sufficient for some indignant Cockneys to refuse to be sworn other than in the English fashion, but microbes never so active, but I have not heard that native resentment at the attempt to introduce another Scotch custom to London has had any effect in reducing the consumption of mountain dew.

HERBERT G. TEMPLE ENDS HIS LIFE

MONTREAL, January 20.—Herbert Grayville Temple, manager of the "Traders' Collecting Agency," committed suicide this afternoon in his office in the New York Life Building, by putting a revolver in his mouth and pulling the trigger. He had been alone for some hours before ending his life, and it was several hours later before he was discovered. It is supposed that Temple decided to end his life rather than face an uphill struggle against debt, aided by the Lacombe law, under which most of his earnings went to his creditors and lawyers. He had been very hard up for some time, but early in January took out a life insurance policy with the Knights of Pythias for three thousand dollars in favor of his three children, his wife having been dead for some time.

Temple came to Montreal from Halifax about eight years ago, and was well known in Montreal as a business man, being apparently in a good way of doing well until his suicide showed that he had fallen behind.
