### BOER WAR GLEANINGS.

Although from time to time for months past we have been assured that the war in South Africa was approaching its close desultory fighting still continues. The British forces now have the upper hand everywhere, however, and Lord Kitchener now mainly reports surrenders and captures of Boers and their stock rather than surprises and losses which befell our troops earlier in the war. It is clearly the enemy that is suffering most these days.

What to do with the prisoners and non-combatants is a troublesome question. Some prisoners were sent to St. Helena, and a few thousands to Ceylon months ago, and there are now 17,000 more on hand in South Africa. Besides these are numerous refugees who are not prisoners in the ordinary sense, numbering 20,671 in the various camps in the Transvaal. These include many women and children, all of whom are being fed and the children being educated at the expense of the British Government. This charge will be continued until the Boers who are under arms are forced to surrender. The Boers are actually the better able to keep the field and continue the fighting because their wives, sisters and children are being thus kindly cared for, and they appear to have the utmost confidence that their families will not be harmed. This is a strange feature of the war as it now stands.

The British Government have been casting about for a place to bestow the prisoners now on hand. It is not easily practicable to keep them all in South Africa, nor is it desirable to send too many to any one place beyond the seas. Moreover the Colonies do not relish the idea of having Boer prisoners quartered upon their soil. The Governor General of Australia has been asked whether a few thousands of them could be taken to Tasmania, but his Government was averse to the proposal. The Australian idea is to fight the Boers, not to give them hospitable shelter, even as prisoners. Two of the Bermuda Islands are, however, preparing to receive a quota of them, which will be the first consignment to this side of the Atlantic.

We note that a warning has been issued to the rebels in Cape Colony that in the future they will be tried by court-martial, the local act providing for their trial by the civil courts having expired by limitation. The Kroonstadt Peace Committee has also warned Botha, Dewet and other leaders that a majority of their countrymen are no longer in favor of continuing the war they will petition the British Government to outlaw such as may hereafter continue hostilities. Some of the surrendered Boers are reported to be now assisting in the capture of the armed burghers who are still fighting. This is a favorable omen.

Down to date the British forces in South Africa are practically as numerous as at any stage of the war and the operations are being conducted at vast expense—about \$7,500,000 a week. Some apprehension is also felt lest during the winter season, now close at hand in that southern country, a considerable body of the fighting burghers may escape to the bush veldt in the northern Transvaal, where they can manage to live for months and can evade attack from British troops in a country difficult of access but with which the Boers are thoroughly acquainted. And there still remains the difficult problem of how to treat the disarmed enemy when the war is over, so as to restore tranquility, content and prosperity under an acceptable civil government with free institutions.

The bubonic plague causes considerable concern in South Africa. So far there have been 519 cases reported in Cape Colony, with 217 deaths, 47 of these being Europeans. Recently a case of the disease was found at Mafeking, thus marking a new centre of infection.

It is not pleasant to read that Hon. John Haggart and Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, both members of the late Conservative Government, strongly opposed at its third reading the bill granting the additional subsidy of \$30,000 a year to Prince Edward Island. Their opposition is in line with the narrow and sectional spirit which characterizes a portion of the Ontario population to which we referred a few days ago. Hon. A. G. Blair of New Brunswick came gallantly to the rescue and assisted Sir Louis Davies in carrying the measure through. The incident affords some light upon the question as to who are the Island's friends and who are not.

So serious has the tramp nuisance become along some American railways that the Pennsylvania and Erie lines have adopted special police measures for the protection of their railway interests. It was found that since the opening of the Pan American Exhibition at Buffalo tramps were swarming on the lines leading to that city. Now the Erie has divided its line into 12 districts, each with a police superintendent charged to keep the tracks clear of tramps. Other railways are expected to take similar precautions. Railways have been the mainstay of the tramps. If the hoboes could no longer steal rides on freight trains, or on front of mail or express cars, many of them would weary of the profession and perhaps go to work. The railways on the mainland of Canada also have their share of tramps, from which our insular position protects us on the Island. By the way, is not our exemption from tramps one more attraction for tourist visitors?
