AN ARDUOUS CALLING.

The men engaged in the work of transporting the mails across the Straits are engaged in an arduous calling. Only men of good physique, stout and strong and with abundant energy and pluck would care to undertake it. Those who have not crossed by the iceboats have little conception of what it means to drag these boats laden with sacks of mail, and occasionally with the baggage of passengers, added, across the hummocks and pitfalls of the passage. When open water is reached the boats with their contents must be launched, and all must jump in as they can and be ready with oar or sail as the case requires to speed the boats on their way. Again and again the boats have to be dragged out of the water and hauled across the intervening ice and again launched into the water.

If there is detention, by storm or other unusual difficulties, the tide has to be reckoned with. Then it is hard, and perhaps impossible to make a landing. The boats and their crews are carried at the rate of three or four miles an hour far up or down the straits. Then when the landing has been effected the tons of mail have to be conveyed through the deep snow to Tormentine or Traverse as the case may be. It is not infrequently happens that after crossing the entire breadth of the Strait the boatmen must retrace their

weary way to the point of departure. No crossing has been made, and the following day the attempt must be repeated. In worse cases, when thick storms come up, shutting out sight of the shore, the crews are in imminent danger of being compelled to spend the night on the ice in zero cold and with strong winds blowing. Great peril to life ensues, with the certainty of frozen limbs at best in these cases.

In snow and cold, often with wet feet and limbs, perspiring at times from great exertion and afterward chilled to the bone, these men ply their laborious calling without serious peril. Theirs is inter-provincial work, work done for the Dominion of Canada, work without which an entire Province would be deprived of its mails. We venture to say boldly that these men ought to be well paid and well cared for. We do not think they are sufficiently remunerated in view of the arduous and perilous character of their work, its great importance and the energy and fidelity with which it is performed. These men have rendered faithful service, and we must not forget that for days and weeks at a time they are our sole dependence in maintaining communication between the Island and the outside world.

CIVIC OWNERSHIP.

Do not forget that one week from today all citizens will be called to vote on the important question of city ownership of an electric lighting plant. City ownership is rapidly gaining ground throughout the world. It is the rule in the best governed cities of the British Isles. Under the best conditions it gives the people their street lighting at cost. We have a fine example of civic management of important public services in the well-conducted water works and sewerage system of this city at the present time. Of course it will be said that the production of electric light is a different matter, requiring expert skill, and so on, but we fail to see why the city cannot command such expert and scientific knowledge as well as a company can. The members of a corporate company do not, as a rule possess this skill. They have to employ and pay for it. Why cannot the city do the same?

Special attention is directed to the letter of Capt. Joseph Read in another column appointing meetings to be held 7th February throughout the Province to select delegates to the Provincial meeting on the Capes service to be held here February 14th.

There is much complaint among insurers that the promised reduction in the rate of fire insurance has not gone into effect. The Board of Underwriters required of the city the construction of an additional water main, the purchase of additional hose and modern ladders, and the appointment of an inspector of electrical appliances. The city is now well equipped, with the abundant water, the fire department is prompt and efficient, and the fire losses within the past year were moderate. The people pay for these things and at the same time are paying extra rates for insurance, put on because these improvements were formerly wanting but since supplied. This does not look right, and the general complaint appears to be well-founded.

WRECKS OF THE YEAR.

OTTAWA, Jan. 29.—The annual report of the Marine Department shows that the total number of casualties to British and Canadian sea going vessels reported to the Department as having occurred in Canadian waters and to Canadian seagoing vessels in waters other than those of Canada during the twelve months ended June 30th, 1904, was 192, representing a tonnage of 81,113 tons register, the amount of loss both partial and total, to vessels and cargoes was \$189,000.
