The preliminary arrangements are going forward for the organization of a dehydration plant here, Lt.-Col. G. E. Full said last night when asked what progress had been made toward the establishment of such a plant in Charlottetown.

If the plans materialize the plant would employ 50 persons each shift, Col. Full said, and a crew of this size would be warranted judging from the description of the dehydration process as outlined by him.

will keep all the moisture away until the product is used. When the potatoes reach their destination they are ready for consumption when boiling water is added which brings the potatoes back to the same state as they were before dehydration.

Not only potatoes will be dehydrated but practically all vegetables grown in Canada that are required for the use of the armed forces such as turnips, carrots, beets, cabbage, onions and celery.
