AMHERST, N.S., Nov. 14.—After nearly two years of anxious waiting because their son, Private Lloyd Higgs, was a prisoner in Germany, the hearts of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Higgs, of Maccan, were made glad by a cable from London stating that he had made good his escape, and had arrived in London. Other particulars are awaited with keen interest by the happy family. Private Higgs enlisted with the 17th Nova Scotia Highlanders at St. Julien, where the 13th suffered fearful losses. Private Higgs was taken prisoner. No word had been received from him for some months, so that the friends who had anticipated the worst were most happily surprised by the telegram from their gallant son Saturday.

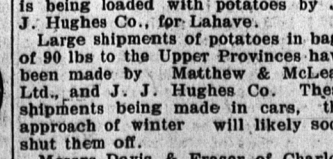

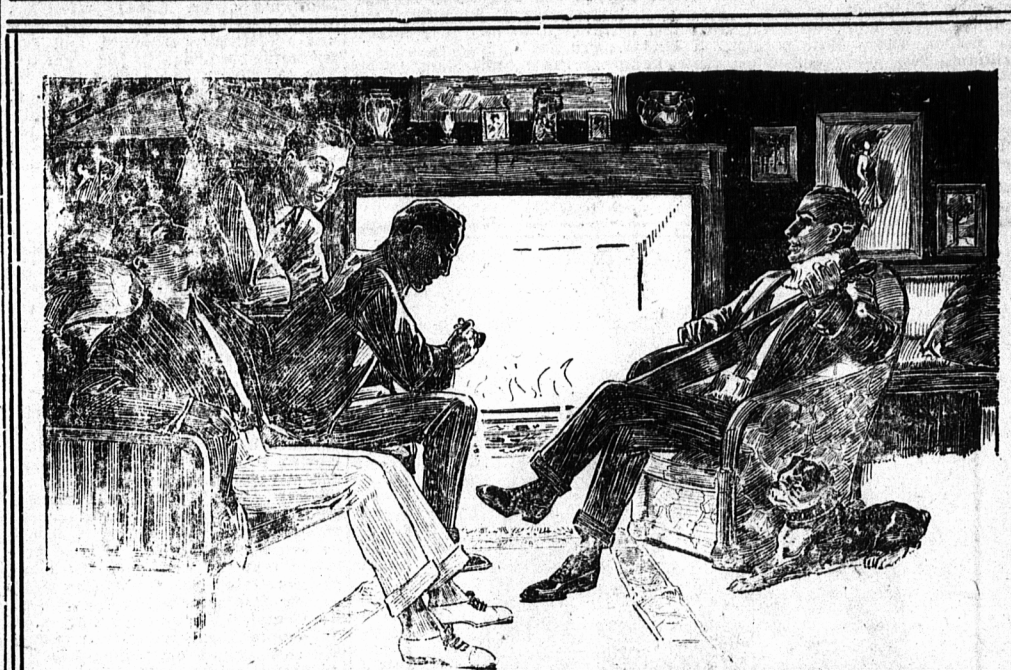
