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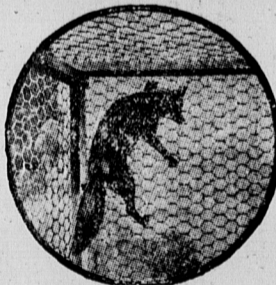

In the course of his remarks he explained that there was blight present in certain sections of the province and that thorough spraying should be continued.

Speaking of Mosaic and Leaf Roll Mr. Peppin urged careful growers to resort to the Tuber Unit method of planting in order to keep up their supply of disease free seed. In Green Mountains seconds should under no consideration be used for seed.

Chief Potato Inspector At Field Day  
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Expert Floriculturist  
In connection with the Illustration Station Field Days now being held in the province Mr. D. C. Schurman, Asst. Superintendent, Experimental Station, Charlottetown, is giving a number of lectures and demonstrations on the growing of flowers, shrubs and trees for improving the appearance of farm homes. At the Field Day at Montague Mr. Schurman clearly demonstrated to an interested audience the best varieties to grow and the proper method of planting the same in order to get the best effect. It was also pointed out that thousands of dollars are spent annually in buying shrubbery and flowers

wholly unsuitable to the province. Within the next few years a number of suitable varieties of flowers and shrubs will be planted at each station for demonstration purposes and Mr. Schurman has been selected to advise the supervisor in the selection and proper planting of the material. Mr. Schurman will be at the Field Day at West Devon Tuesday August 12 th, and all interested in the subject will be sure to obtain some helpful information.

SPRAY MIXING DEMONSTRATION  
At the Illustration Station Field Days held at Rose Valley, Rustico and New London a feature of special interest has been a spray mixing demonstration put on by Messrs Hurst and Howatt of the Plant Pathological Laboratory. The principle and purpose of spraying was first given by Mr. Hurst while the actual demonstration and chemistry of the mixing was given by Mr. Howatt. The following were the main principles emphasized.

(1) The 4-4-40 pounds of hydrated lime of the quality now available is sufficient to neutralize four pounds of copper sulphate.  
(4) Spraying is a preventative of late blight and not a cure. The spray must therefore be on the leaves before the spores of the disease.  
(3) Mix the diluted solutions only.  
(5) Test for free copper (the cause of burning) by using a clear blade of a steel knife or by the use of a few drops of potassium ferri cyanide.  
(6) Bordeaux mixture deteriorates rapidly and spray held over more than a day is of little value. Two ounces of sugar per 40 gallons added to the Bordeaux mixture will retard the deteriorating action.
