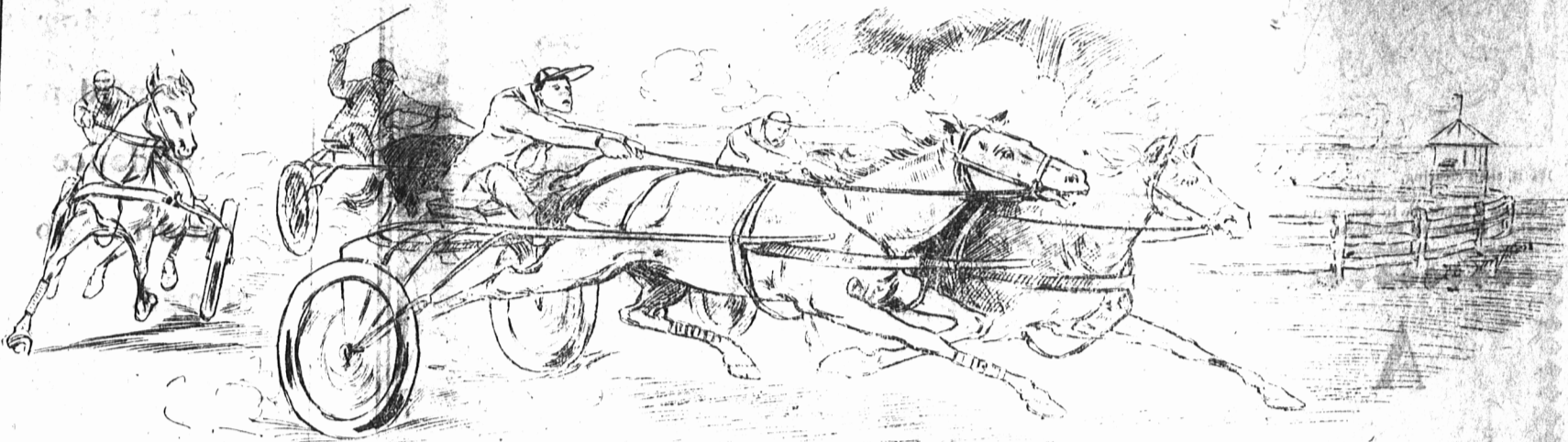

THE JAPANESE CAPTURE DA PAS

Kuroki Wins an Important Position on the Russian Left Flank

PART OF THE GREAT TURNING MOVEMENT

Japan is Confident of Being Able to Match Russia in Number of Armed Forces in Manchuria—Russian Press Feels Japan May Place a Million Men in the Field.



JAPS CAPTURE DA PAS.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—(Special)—Mukden reports that the Japs have assumed the offensive again and Kuroki's force has captured Da Pass, which the Russians evacuated without serious resistance.

LITTLE NEWS FROM THE FRONT.

There is no other fresh news from the seat of war.

JAPAN PREPARED TO GO ON.

The Japanese press declare that Japan is prepared to continue the war and confident she has the ability to place in the field at any time a larger army than Russia.

WHAT THE RUSSIAN PRESS SAY.

The Russian papers say that Russia must prepare to meet an army over a million strong.

[The capture of Da Pass is important as it lets Kuroki's force through the mountains and gives effect to the turning movement which has been for some time in progress. The opinion of military experts appears to be that Mukden is a less defensible position than Liao Yang. All of which makes it more doubtful whether Kuroki will risk a decisive battle at or near Mukden. The opinions of the Japanese and Russian press point to an increase of forces on both sides and a determined prolongation of the war. The Japanese appear to believe that they will continue to match Russia in Manchuria with equal or superior numbers.]

The exhibit is supplemented by a very creditable window in the new Prowse Block, Sunny-side and a new showcase which has just been placed at their entrance, Guardian Office stairs.

One of the greatest attractions at the Exhibition during the past few days has been the wonderful display of work done on Singer Sewing Machines. FAST TROTTING AT THE DRIVING PARK

Simassie Equals the Track Record of John T. Last Year.

TRACK WAS IN EXCELLENT CONDITION

And the Day a Perfect One for Racing—There was a Big Attendance of Spectators—Cameron Thrown from his Sulky and Horse Ran Away but Neither was Injured

There was fully as big a crowd at the Horse Races yesterday as on the previous day. The track was in excellent condition, could not be better, and the day was ideal. With the exception of James Hooper, Truro, added to the Timor and Dr. Jakeman retired from the list of Judges. The official were as on Wednesday.

FREE FOR ALL.

FIRST HEAT.

Four horses were entered as follows: Gilty (p. 16) Daisy DeWitt, Simassie, Capitola. They got away with a fairly good start at the sixth score. Gilty held the lead to the 1/2 when Simassie who had been conceded first place from her previous performances throughout the provinces and her record of 2:04 1/2 took first place and was never headed winning in 2:18 1/2. Willis made gallant fight with Gilty and was only a length behind at the wire. Daisy DeWitt and Capitola held respectively third and fourth throughout the heat.

SECOND HEAT.

The horses got away at the first score. Semassie took the lead at the start was never headed, Capitola and Gilty were fighting hard for second and while at 1/2 pole Gilty broke and Fred Cameron the driver of Capitola was thrown from

his sulky which collided with that of Gilty. The driverless horse went around the track and was plucked by the place of the accident. Neither horse or driver were seriously hurt. The finish was Simassie 1st, Gilty 2nd, Daisy DeWitt 3rd and Capitola was given fourth place as the accident was pronounced by the judges an unavoidable one. Time 2:26.

THIRD HEAT.

The horses got away on third. Semassie again led from start to finish winning in 2:17 1/2 equalling the track record of 2:17 held by John T. Gilty made a bad break and was passed by Daisy DeWitt but secured second again at the 1/2. Capitola was in bad form and was not dangerous to the others.

FIRST HEAT.

The horses drew positions as follows: Parker L. pole, Alice H. Cock o' the North, Kremella. The horses got away on the fourth. Parker L. took the lead with Bonita second and the others in the following order: Alice H., Cock o' the North and Kremella. Throughout the heat Parker L. and Bonita were neck-and-neck with the former a little in the lead but at the finish the bay stallion by a magnificent spurt drew out and won by half a length. It was a great fight. Cock o' the North pressed Alice H. hard for third but could not get the place. Kremella was some distance in the rear. Time was 2:21.

SECOND HEAT.

The horses got away at the fourth score. Bonita took the lead, with Parker L. second, Kremella third, Alice H. fourth, and Cock o' the North fifth. Bonita held her position without heading throughout. Parker L. and Kremella fought hard for second, but the former held her position and won by a half length. For fourth place the contest was keen between Cock o' the North and Alice H. The former won the position though closely pressed. Time was 2:23.

THIRD HEAT.

The horses got off on the fourth score. Bonita was never headed, Parker L. was chased hard for second by Kremella but she won by a length. The first three horses trotted from start to finish without a break. Cock o' the North and Alice H. alternately held fourth place but Cock o' the North secured the place at the wire. Time 2:24.
