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At the meeting of the Natural History and Antiquarian Society in Y. M. C. A. Parlor last night Mr. Percy Pope read a paper discussing the question "Does the acceptance of the teachings of Science destroy Belief on the Reality of Religion?" The subject was dealt within a very clear and exhaustive manner. The matter was carefully thought out and concisely expressed and aimed at proving that the question should be answered in the negative. The animated discussion which followed, participated in by Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, Revs. T. F. Fullerton and Dr. McMillan, Messrs. J. E. B. McCreedy and Arthur Mellish proved that there were differences of opinion upon several points touched upon by the lecturer but each speaker in turn, as did also the President, spoke in eulogistic terms of the merits of the paper. The meeting was one of the best attended, most interesting and spirited in the history of the Society, and brought to a close the season's series of meetings generously thrown open to the public by this estimable Society which is doing a work of high educational value in the community.

THE entertainment given by the Loyal Crusaders of North Westshire on Monday evening was an unqualified success in every particular.
